

Membership

The membership of the Association is made up of the following categories of members: Life Members, Ordinary Members, Associate Members and Student Members. For both Ordinary Members and Associate Members the annual subscription is \$12, while that for Student Members is \$3. By paying \$150 in one single sum either an Ordinary Member or an Associate Member may become a Life Member and will henceforth be exempted from payment of further annual subscriptions. In the year under review there was a total of 623 members on the membership register of whom 301 were paying members and 45, Life Members. 98 new members joined the Association in the course of the year of whom 12 were Ordinary Members and 86, Student Members.

K.C.O.B.A. Primary School

The K.C.O.B.A. Primary School which was inaugurated in September, 1960 was now in its 4th year of development. It was still having Mr. Shum Choi Sang, President of the Association, as the Chairman of its Board of Directors and Mr. Edmund Y. M. Sun as its Supervisor. Its three sessions (morning, afternoon and night) which were staffed by 15 masters and 30 mistresses provided education for 1,462 school children. The curriculum offered was that of an ordinary Government primary school, that is, it taught subjects such as Chinese, English, Arithmetic, Social Studies, Nature Study, General Knowledge, Health Education, Art, Handwork, Music and Physical Education. Ranging from Primary 1 to Primary 6, the

A. M. School and the P. M. School had 12 classes each and the Night School 11 classes. Of the 540 pupils studying in the first-named, 358 were boys and 182 were girls; of the 529 in the second-named, 306 boys and 223 girls; and of the 393 in the last-named, 125 boys and 268 girls. In the course of the year each of the three sessions was granted a quota of Primary 6 pupils to the Secondary School Entrance Examination — 51 for the A. M. School, 87 for the P. M. School and 23 for the Night School. The first two did very well in the Examination: 36 and 72 pupils gained promotion to Form 1 respectively, while the last one, because of the shorter lesson hours offered, was less fortunate — only one candidate succeeded in doing so. Besides, one of the P. M. School boys won a special Government Scholarship tenable for 5 years.

Sports

The double-site bathing pavilion of the Association at Stanley was, as usual, open for use to members and their families during the hot summer months.

There is an indoor badminton court in King's College. With the kind permission of the Principal, it was available for use to members of the Associations for two nights (Tuesday and Friday nights) every week. The times for playing were arranged by the Convener of the Sports subcommittee.

Social Functions

When the school year in 1963 was coming to an end and pupils of Upper and Lower Form 6 and Form 5 of King's College were about to leave school either to earn their own living or to pursue a higher course of studies, a meeting between them and members of your Committee as well as a number of other Old Boys was arranged by the Association at a tea party held at the College Hall on July 19th. The party was more than an ordinary social function; it aimed at fulfilling another task, that of advising K. C. Old Boys of the younger generation as regards the kind of career they would like to take up. Consequently, members of the General Committee and Old Boys from the Association divided themselves up into groups according to their professions and answered as best as they could questions put to them concerning their respective professions such as doctors, engineers, lawyers, teachers, journalists, etc. The party was well attended and the meeting between the two was extremely pleasant.

The Annual Dinner for the year was held at the Ying King restaurant, 179, Johnston Road on the night of 29th February, 1964. The whole first floor of the restaurant which was reserved for the party was filled to capacity. Entertainment for the night was provided by the Blue Star Orchestra and Miss Anita Quiletorio, a talented vocalist. Besides, persons turning up for the party were thrilled by the demonstration of a well known Yoga instructor. Among the guests present were Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Gregg, Director of Education, and Mr. and Mrs. G. S. Coxhead, Principal of King's College. As was usual for such a party there was a lucky draw. In the party a large number of post-war Old Boys and pupils of King's College could be seen. This was a healthy sign, since it indicated that more and more of them had begun to take an interest in the activities of the Association.

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Mediterranean was a pool of safety until Italy came in on the side of the enemy. So tight, though, had security precautions been that no one at this end expected the new recruit on that well-remembered 15th of January, 1940. But the Director, Mr. C. G. Sollis, was not put out by my sudden appearance; surprises were common in war-time, and graver ones were in store for us.

The day after my arrival I reported for duty to Mr. H. G. Wallington, who had taken over as Principal of King's College a year earlier. Within two weeks I was sworn-in as a member of the Volunteers, and given the rank of gunner which kept me company for the next six years. My life was divided between teaching and military training, while the storm-clouds blew nearer and nearer. . . .

In 1937 the Sino-Japanese War had broken out, and a year later Canton had fallen. Our first big jolt had come with the sight of Japanese troops on the other side of the border. But there they had remained. As the months grew into years, the average citizen put his fears on the shelf. In 1940 families were evacuated, but bachelor parties became gayer, the yarns told at them more improbable. The moment of rude awakening was on the way.

It came when enemy planes swooped out of a clear dawn sky and destroyed our tiny air force at Kai Tak: the date was the 8th of December, 1941. All at once civilians became soldiers, fighting side-by-side with regulars in a desperate attempt to stop the seemingly endless hordes of the advancing enemy. Men who had spent their days in schools and offices were now spending days and nights skirmishing on Mount Parker, or range-taking for the big guns on Stanley Peninsula. Resistance was stubborn in the face of hopeless odds, and many a gallant stand helped to thwart Tokyo's prediction of a seven-day victory. But the inevitable result came, when the Union Jack was lowered over Government House on Christmas Day, 1941. The short Hong Kong war was over. Although it had lasted only seventeen days, fighting had been fierce and volunteer casualties heavy. The Education Department itself had lost several members, and still more fell victim to malnutrition and other ills of the prison camp. For those who, like myself, were lucky enough to keep life and health, times were hard but the joyful days of freedom lay ahead. Now, when I look back on those years, my only regret is for the many friends who did not live to share the fruits of victory.

With the coming of peace there began the difficult period of reconstruction. It was a time when much of Hong Kong lay in ruins. Among them was the looted shell of King's College, which had survived the war intact only to be destroyed in the catastrophic fortnight before British rule came back. The damage was not only material. It was a sad fact that many children had grown up without education; the average school age was far too high. It took most of a decade for things to return to normal. But return they did, and today it is safe to say that our education stands better than ever before.

In the late '40's I would drive past the empty frame of the school and wonder when it would again be populated with students and teachers. But, for the time being, my fortunes were bound up with our sister school

Queen's, for which I was busy planning a geography room. This project and many others became fact when, in 1950, the school moved into its present beautiful building at Causeway Bay. Everything one touched was straight from the makers, except for one object which had made news when it was found in the rubble of the old building. This was the marble bust of Dr. Bateson Wright, and with due ceremony he was set up on a pillar in the entrance hall. And there you can see him now, his keen eye ever searching for signs that the prestige of the school he ruled so long is being upheld. Yes, it was exciting to be on the first staff of the "Old Lady of Aberdeen Street" in her new home. At the same time King's, built up again to a modest two storeys, opened its doors as a primary school. There were no headlines, but this also was an important new beginning.

Coming back from leave, I found myself "in the office". It was a change to be administering the grant code, and another — closer to my well-trodden path — to be the first inspector of geography. For six years my journeys, taking me to innumerable schools, had a nomadic character which might well appeal to a geographer. Then came my acting appointment here and in September, 1960 I took over from my predecessor, Mr. C. W. Sargison. A circuit, begun twenty years earlier, was completed.

* * * *

And so the Principal is brought back to the part which he has carried, on-stage and off, for six years out of the twenty-five. What a lively part it has proved, so full of impromptu happenings, new interests, amusing people — yes, you yourselves! Playing it has its trickier moments now and then, and Peter Quince's simple instruction to roar has to be treated with some reserve. Mercifully, many an awkward corner is turned by invoking that talented improvisor, "Bully Bottom": the tone of the roar is made flexible, to suit the lion and the nightingale. All in all, the Principal's part is an enviable one, marked by its rich rewards. But his chosen title is far too ambitious, for who on earth will back him for a second twenty-five? Be that as it may, he will be happy to continue, while time allows, to "roar you as gently as any sucking dove". He is not afraid of the reception, as you must have got well used to the strange mixture of sounds long before this.

were scarce, and while waiting for one I became an air-raid warden in my village, Chalfont St. Peter. One of my duties was to ensure that everyone had a gas mask and knew how to use it; the gas attacks of World War I were still fresh in memory. The war was several years over before the armed forces withdrew these ugly contraptions as obsolete. Why

did they do so? One reason could be that the wind, always unpredictable, may suddenly change and waft all the gas back to the originator. A more cynical view is that we approve of blowing up our brother with high explosives, but cannot tolerate his extinction by poison or radio-active fallout. Can we find here a promising theme for the Debating Society?

Steel helmets and sand-bags were left behind when an urgent message came from Loughborough College School, where I had taught for the summer term of 1939. Several of the staff had been called up — could I fill a gap of only two or three weeks? It was while I was there that my passage to Hong Kong came through on the "Stratheden", one of the newest and fastest P. & O. ships. Speedier than enemy submarines she was unescorted, but the voyage had its exciting moments. On the second day out, somewhere in "The Bay", passengers watched the sun set on the wrong side while the captain pitted his wits against an unseen marauder beneath the waves. 
A Midsummer Night's Dream




King's College before World War II
















INTER-SCHOOL CONTESTS 1963-64





This is the result of the Association's assiduous efforts to absorb fresh blood, a policy reflected in the membership figures. Membership for the year stands at 550. The influx of post-war ex-students now far exceeds that of the pre-war group.

The double-site bathing pavilion at Stanley Beach is an excellent means of recreation, and is open for the use of all members and their families throughout the summer season.

rnotographic Club

Talks on various photographic topics have been arranged regularly throughout the session.

The 8th Hong Kong Students' Photographic Contest was again sponsored by our Club. We received a large number of entries, in spite of the fact that the competition was held late in the session. Five well-known local photographers were invited as judges and their comment on the standard of the entries was favourable. Our photographers Luk Kong and Lee Mow Chiu were placed first and second respectively in the Black-and-White Section. Mrs. P. R. Halliwell gave away the prizes at a ceremony on 29th April, 1963.

A team of photographers from our members in Form IV undertook a photographic record during the Camp School in Tsuen Wan. Their work was exhibited during the Open Day.

Debating Society

The Debating Society, re-formed at the beginning of the year, held ten debates. Some debates concerned school life: the society declared itself whole-heartedly in favour of co-education and in favour of a liberal education — a theme suggested by Professor Blunden's address to the School last Speech Day. Surprisingly, perhaps, the Society opposed the abolition of detention in school. More general topics included the advantages and disadvantages of living in the twentieth century and the goodness of human nature.

Members of the 5th Form were well rewarded for attendance at one debate on the value of sending rockets to the moon when this very same topic appeared on their School Certificate English Essay paper some months later. Although we regret we cannot guarantee this to happen again, we look forward to a continued growth of this now flourishing Society.

Handicraft Club

The existence of a woodwork room, dating from the time when we were a primary school, has long been a challenge to us. This club, instituted in February, 1963 is a partial answer; the room, being too small for class work, is ideal for club projects. A staff adviser with expert knowledge in this field has made possible the remarkable progress of a few months. A relief-model of Tsuen Wan is one of the club's accomplishments.

An ambitious programme, launching out into several crafts, is planned.

St. John Ambulance Society

This group, like the preceding, was founded in February, 1963. Its activities come under two headings: training in First Aid and attendance duty with a roster. The duty hours cover those periods of the day when accidents are most likely to occur on the playground.

Science Society

Inaugurated in February, the new society has made several works visits, and has had an excursion to the Peak to practise field use of the barometer. An active future is anticipated.

Religious Societies

The Christian Fellowship held two Bible-study groups, which met weekly during the lunch-break. The senior group was under the guidance of Mr. K. C. Chue, while Miss R. Chiu took care of the juniors. A joint Christmas Service was held with three other schools, and the Easter Holiday picnic at the Children's Garden, Wu Kai Sha, was a great success.

The Catholic Society worked hard to promote its two-fold object: to promote friendship among the Catholics in the school and to provide opportunities for them to take part in religious discussions.

A quiz contest on the topic "The Holy Mass" was held on 5th December, and our team took first place.

The Society attended the annual Christmas tea-party at St. Paul's Convent School, an occasion as festive as it was colourful.

Fifth Hong Kong Scout Group

Prince of Wales Trek Camp Competition (November, 1962):

Our Troop, having come first in the combined Victoria City and Western District Competition, represented these two districts and in the final competition were runners-up to the 1st Hong Kong Group by a very close margin. This was a big improvement on last year's performance.

Combined District Lightweight Competition (April and August):

Taking second place in the earlier contest (cooking), the patrol sent to the later event (poincering) won it outright.

Camping:

Many camps have been attended. In the Combined District Camping Competition held at Tate's Pass in August, 1963, we were placed third.

Public Service:

Senior or Junior Scouts have been seen doing duty on all school occasions, and in addition have served at the Old Boys' Primary School Speech Day and other outside functions,

Individual Success:

Chan Ming Kui, our Troop Leader, was awarded in March the Scout Cord, highest prize in the Scout Section.

Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme

The School has been invited to participate in this Scheme, which has as its object the training of boys to make good use of their leisure hours. A course was initiated for that purpose in February.

Twelve boys were selected, and regular weekly meetings and occasional out-door trainings arranged with a view to train the boys in such skills as map-reading, first aid, the cultivation of physical fitness, and camping. So far, they have been successful in passing three sections out of four required by their syllabus, and it is hoped that they will attain their Bronze Award at the end of November, this year.

The Camp School

King's College Camp School, held at Survey Camp No. 1, Sheung Kwai Chung, represented a new departure for the school. Here, for four days, 10 teachers and 40 pupils from Form 4 carried out an interesting experiment which aimed at completing a serious piece of study and at the same time giving the pupils some experience of "community-living".

The major project was "Tsuen Wan — A Study in Microgeography". For this the pupils were divided into four groups, each with a specific topic to study. These were A — Topography of the Area; B — Vegetation of the Area; C — Land Utilisation in the Area; D — Industrial Development in the Area. To carry out their work, the pupils attended lessons in the morning given by the teachers staying

For the second year there are 28 classes and 26 classrooms. It has been arranged that the two non-domiciled classes do not comprise the same pupils as those who suffered this fate last year.

Curriculum and Syllabus

The course of study from Form 1 to Form 5, the School Certificate year, includes all the normal school subjects, namely: English Language and Literature, Chinese Language, Chinese Literature and History, Translation, Oral Kuo Yu, Geography, History, Civics, Pure Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Art, Music and Physical Education. The three branches of Science are taught separately throughout the school.

The Science Lower 6 two classes have studied English Language, Chinese Language, Translation, Geography, Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry and Biology. The two classes of the Upper 6 followed courses leading to the advanced level subjects required for entry to the Science and Medical Faculties of Hong Kong University.

A class of Arts Lower Six has been opened for the current school year, a fact worthy of note although it does not come within the purview of this Report.

The syllabuses of all subjects taught in the school were completely revised, and a new syllabus of Mathematics, Forms r to 3, was introduced.

Student Teachers

3 student teachers from the Hong Kong University and 6 from the Northcote Training College observed lessons and did their practice teaching in this school during the year. They were treated as temporary members of staff and helped the school not only by way of classroom teaching, but in extra-curricular activities as well.

Library

The School Library is always the centre of our student activities during the lunch hour. To avoid over-congestion in the library, the admission dates for various forms have been staggered. The result is quieter and more comfortable reading in the library.

Many new books have been added to our library, requiring the addition of several new shelves.

The borrowing procedure has been revised so as to ensure that every book taken out from the library has been properly loaned. The aim is to give our pupils a good training in library behaviour while they are in the school, looking to the years ahead.

The number of books on accession in September, 1963 was 18,171.

The School Magazine

The school magazine, "The Fig Tree", continues to be an excellent record of the school year. It also offers children their first opportunity to "see themselves in print". No pupil should go through his school life without attempting to get at least one piece of original writing published. Unfortunately costs have risen, limiting the amount that can be accepted, and this year necessitating a rise in the cost of the magazine. But the many replies received, some of them from overseas, show the project to be fully worth the effort and expense.

Societies and Clubs

Geography Society

The year has been an active one for the Society, with several lectures, film-shows, and a number of excursions some of which have taken the members farther afield than hitherto. Noteworthy were a trip to the Ma On Shan Iron Mine and a day spent on the study of coastal formation at Cheung Chau. Middle form members visited the Royal Observatory, and those from Form I did an elementary survey of the Botanical Gardens. Work in the geography room was not neglected, two members constructing a relief-model of Hong Kong Island.

1964

Many members took part in the Camp School held at Tsuen Wan, whose main project was geographical.

Biology Circle and Gardening Club

It has been a year of exceptional activity, with a run of films, senior and junior, and a number of field trips. The latter have covered a wide range of localities and subjects for study: for example, pond life at Cape D'Aguilar and seaweeds at Stanley. Fermentation was seen in action at the Ka Wa Distillery, Aberdeen.

At the school camp in April, the Circle made a detailed study of the vegetation of Tsuen Wan.

Seasonal flowers have, as before, been grown from seed by the members of the Club.

Music

The school entered in 2 Choir items, 2 Choral Speaking items, 2 Harmonica Band and Ensemble items, and 53 pupils performed in 12 different individual items of the Music Festival. The results are as follows:

"Observe more, and practise a lot." This counsel by the Club Adviser has been taken seriously, so that the regular outdoor sketching parties have been well attended.

Among the Club's activities may be mentioned lectures, some by the Adviser and some by the Inspector of Art, Mr. M. F. Griffith; and visits to art exhibitions, notably those held at the City Hall. Among the latter, the Exhibition of Children's Art from Britain was perhaps the most popular.



THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH'S AWARD SCHEME

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme was initiated by His Royal Highness and launched in 1956 under the direction of Sir John Hunt. It offers to boys between their 14th and 19th birthdays a challenge to endeavour and achievement through a balanced programme of leisure time activities. It is essentially a personal challenge from the Duke of Edinburgh to individual boys, not to compete against other boys but to measure themselves against the standards set for each level of the Award. These standards are within the reach of the average boy provided he makes the effort and sticks to it.

In essence the Scheme is an introduction to purposeful leisure. From it, through new interests and new activities, boys can gain that sense of achievement which comes from meeting a challenge and giving of one's best. It is a Scheme offered to schools, clubs, firms, training establishment and all organisations concerned with youth services. It is designed as a complement to their existing activities and, far from cutting across their curriculum, many are finding in it a new stimulus and a means of co-operation with others in the same field.

In Hong Kong this Scheme is worked under the Operating Committee with Hon. Fung Ping-fan, O.B.E., K. St. J., J.P., as the Chairman, and Mr. G. H. Strokes as Hon,. Secretary, having its office at Y.M.C.A., Waterloo Road, Kowloon.

Mr. C. L. Ho, our teacher, took the lead in organizing a course in School to train us to participate in this Scheme. A meeting was held for that purpose on 13th February, 1963 in the Lecture Room at 4.05 p.m. Mr. S. C. Leung and Mr. L. Wong also attended the meeting and kindly consented to help us.

There were some thirty applicants but Mr. Ho said that he could manage twelve only at most this year to start with.





General

In reviewing the work of the year it is gratifying to note that among the members who jointed the Association between 1962 and 1963 many are post-war Old Boys. The membership of the Association, as you are aware, is made up in the main of pre-war Old Boys, and if this state of things is allowed to go on, it would not be in the best interest of the Association. This is why ever since King's College resumed full operation as a secondary school, the Association has been bending its efforts in the direction of absorbing fresh blood into its being. Membership

The total membership of the Association for the year stands at 550 of whom 42 are life members and 330 are paying members. This represents an increase of 19 over last year's figure. Of the new members who joined the Association in the course of the year post-war Old Boys far outnumber their pre-war counterparts. This is encouraging because it serves to show that more and more post-war Old Boys have begun to take an active interest in the activities of the Association.

King's College camp school at Survey Camp No. I, Sheung Kwai Chung, represented a new departure for the school. Here, for four days, 10 teachers and 40 pupils from Form IV carried out an interesting experiment which aimed at completing a serious piece of study and at the same time giving the pupils some experience of 'company-living'.

The major project was 'Tsuen Wan — a study in Microgeography'. For this the pupils were divided into four groups, each with a specific topic to study. These were A — Topography of the area, B — Vegetation, C — Land Utilisation in the Area, D — Industrial Development in the Area. To carry out their work the pupils attended lessons in the morning given by the teachers staying at the camp and by a number of visiting lecturers including the District Officer of Tsuen Wan, officers from the Department of Agriculture and Forestry, the Education Department, the Water Authority and a member of the Department of Geology and Geography of the University of Hong Kong. The afternoons were devoted to field trips and visits to factories in the area. In the evenings, when the day's work was done, there was time for relaxation in the form of a film show, country-dancing, music appreciation and a concert.

Life at Camp.
Suffering or Enjoyment?

When we arrived what surprised us most was that the 'camp' was in fact a wooden house with excellent electric and water facilities, and, above all, first-rate toilet facilities. There were altogether three blocks. The first and second blocks consisted of lavatories, bathrooms and kitchens whereas the third consisted of three rooms, or rather four, a dormitory, a recreation room, a staff room and an infinitesimal lady-staff bedroom.

As the camp was not merely for enjoyment but to gather practical knowledge the discipline was rather strict. At 7 o'clock sharp in the morning when your sleep and dreams were sweetest a bell would break the silence urging you to rise. After you had been awakened it would be wise it you dressed in your P. E. uniform at top speed, else, if you were found late, there was a chance you might be washing the lavatory — quite an interesting idea but an unpleasant job.

Still dog-tired we had to take our physical training with everyone stuggling and staggering. After thirty minutes suffering we were allowed to get washed except for the duty members who had to clean up the dormitory as well. When everything was done breakfast was ready. You can imagine the speed with which we scoured the dishes and swallowed the oat-porridge until the dish was shining and the bowl was so clean that further washing was unnecessary. In fact we took less than a quarter of the time allowed to finish the eating — to finish up everything.

At 9 o'clock all groups were quite ready for their lessons. These lasted as in school till 4 o'clock in the afternoon with a recess of twenty minutes and one and a half hours for lunch.

From 5 to 6 the bathroom would be fully packed. Although it was rather cold everyone was brave enough to take a cold bath.

The 7th Annual Students Photographic Contest was sponsored by the Club in March, 1962. Five prominent local photographers acted as judges: Dr. O. Szeto and Mrs. Szeto presented the prizes. 63 schools and colleges took part. K.C. gained and prize and 5 bronze medals, 3 for colour slides. The entries were exhibited in the School Hall for 3 days.

Li Mou Cheung, one of our senior photographers, got an acceptance in the H.K.P.S. International Salon, and won first prize in the 7th Annual Photographic Contest sponsored by Sing Tao Man Po.

Lam Lin Wai gained a prize and 2 honourable mentions in a contest sponsored by the 'China Mail'.

Mr. Wong Shiu Gun, Staff Adviser, became a Fellow of the Royal photographic Society. Mr. Wong also had 3 prints and 2 slides accepted in the H.K.P.S. International Salon, and gained a bronze medal. He is now in the Visual Education section of the Inspectorate.

Sports Clubs

The K.C.O.B.A Primary School, though it remains financially independent, is affiliated with the Association. It is having Mr. Shum Chol Sang, president of the Association, serving as chairman of its board of directors and Mr. Edmund Y. M. Sun, vice-president of the Association, as school supervisor. The school which is staffed by 15 male teachers and 30 female teachers has a total enrolment or 1,511 pupils (856 boys and 655 girls) in its three sessions in the current year as compared with 1,530 in the previous one. They are distributed as follows: 368 boys and 172 girls in the morning session; 329 boys and 195 girls in the afternoon session and 159 boys and 288 girls in the evening session. In the year under review Mr. Wong Kwok In remains headmaster of the afternoon session and Miss Cheng Shuk Ming, headmistress of both the morning and evening sessions. In the current Secondary School Entrance Examination the school entered a total of 106 candidates (52 from the afternoon session and 27 each from the morning and evening sessions) of whom 81 succeeded in gaining admissions to Form 1 (52 from the afternoon session, 21 from the morning session and 8 from the evening session). The school held its second Annual speech Day on 20th November, 1962 and it was very kind of Mr. G. P. Ferguson, Advisor to Hong Kong Students in the United Kingdom and former master of King's College, to give his consent to give away certificates and prizes. On the night of the Annual Speech Day a dinner party was given by the Association at the Kin Kwok restaurant for the entertainment of Mr. Ferguson.

Club House

It is now almost a decade since the Club House moved into its present premises at 4, Stanley Street, 1st floor from 50, Gloucester Road, 3rd floor. Though the present site is not ideal, nevertheless it serves the needs of the Association quite well at its present stage of development. In the course of the year, however, notice was received to the effect that the building would soon be taken back by the landlord for reconstruction. Under such circumstances the incoming General Committee will be confronted with the problem of the removal of the Club House. Should members have any valuable suggestions to make on the subject, they would be welcome.

Bathing Pavilion and Sports

The Association is always trying to provide members with means for recreation as far as its resources will permit. It holds a double-site bathing pavilion at Stanley Main Beach under a Government lease renewable on a year to year basis. The pavilion is a cement-concrete structure provided with all the facilities needed by bathers. The place is open for the use of members and their families throughout the summer season.

With the kind permission of the principal of King's College, members of the Association can now, as years before, make use of the college hall for badminton games. The place is open for the use of members twice a week, i.e. on Tuesdays and Fridays between 7.00 p.m. and 9.00 p.m. Members who wish to play badminton there have only to contact the convenor of the Sports sub-committee of the Association to make arrangements.

Social Functions

In the course of the year the Association had held a series of social functions. Besides the one mentioned above which was given in honour

of the visit in Hong Kong of Mr. G. P. Ferguson, there were three others: (465 one was an informal dinner party held at the Club House on 9th November, 1962, another was a cocktail party given by the General Committee also at the Club House on 1st February, 1963 to celebrate the lunar New Year and still another was a dinner party held at the hall of King's College on the night of 5th January, 1963 on the occasion of the celebration of the 10th anniversary of the reopening of the alma mater as a secondary school. In the case of the last-mentioned party an ad hoc sub-committee was set up to attend to the necessary preparations. It was headed by Mr. Chiu Kuen Bong and made up of representatives from every post-war graduating class of King's College. There were a large number of persons present at the party, including Mr. P. R. Halliwell, acting principal of King's College, and his staff and officers of the Education Department. A very rich programme of entertainment was provided for the night by both pupils of King's College and boxers from Chung Ho Yin's Gymnasium. Highlight of the programme was a lion dance performed by Mr. Chung Ho Yin and his associates. Before the dance started, the tradition of breathing life into the lion by applying cinnabar to its eyes and also of decorating it with tinsel flowers and a red cordon was carefully observed. The former ceremony was performed by Mr. Halliwell and the latter by Mr. Shum Choi Sang, president of the Association. Raffle tickets were drawn that night and the prizes needed for the occasion were donated by members of the General Committee. Thanks to the prolonged and painstaking efforts of the ad hoc sub-committee, the party was quite a success. The unique feature of this party which was also to serve the purpose of the annual reunion dinner of the Association was that the number of post-war Old Boys far exceeded the number of pre-war Old Boys. This was not only unprecedented in the history of the Association but raised the hope that from now on more and more Old Boys of the former category would take part in the activities of the K.C.O.B.A.

Finance

As is evidenced by the Hon. Treasurer's annual statement of accounts, the Association again incurred a deficit in the current year. However, with loans advanced by the president and members of the General Committee, the Association was able to tide over its financial difficulties.

With 27 classes it was found necessary to make one of them itinerant, and the scheme has worked well. This year there are 28 classes, two without classrooms.

Curriculum

The course of study from Form 1 to Form 5, the School Certificate year, includes all the normal school subjects, namely: English Language and Literature, Chinese Language, Chinese Literature and History, Translation, Oral Kuo Yu, Geography, History, Civics, Pure Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Art, Music and Physical Education. The three branches of Science are taught separately throughout the school.

Again it has not been found economical to open a Lower 6 on the Arts side, owing to the small number of pupils opting for Arts. However, there is every will be found at the end of the current year.

The Science Lower 6 two classes have studied English Language, Chinese Language, Translation, Geography, Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry and Biology. The two classes of the Upper 6 followed courses leading to the advanced level subjects required for entry to the Science and Medical Faculties of Hong Kong University.

Subject Interests

No subject takes up more of the school timetable than English. The year under review has seen the drafting of a new syllabus, and a determined attempt to raise the standard of spoken English which, it is felt, is basic to the whole study.

The Biology Circle has been active and has held regular meetings and excursions, for the Circle.

Other interests are recorded in the Societies notes.

Student Teachers

Joining the staff at different stages of the year, 3 students from the University and 3 from the Northcote Training College have observed lessons and taught in the middle and lower classes.

The school sent several classes of Form $_3$ to the University for demonstration lessons, and certain classes were taught by our own staff before an audience of training college students.

The School Premises

Before the school year began, the small and inadequate school office was converted into a visitors' room and a staffroom became the office, its occupants moving

upstairs to a better room. This necessitated the wandering class already referred to under Class Organisation.

During the year two more classrooms have been turned to special use, namely a visual-aids room and a music room. It is the first time that music has enjoyed its own room, and the one chosen is well away from other classrooms.

Library

The year, for the first time, the library has been in full commission during the summer holidays: a happy development made possible by the speeding-up of the annual stock-taking. A very large number of pupils availed themselves of the new facility, and it can truthfully be said that holiday reading is now 'in'.

Two new index-card cabinets were added to the library just before the beginning of the September term, making a total of four. Due to the hard work of Student Assistant Librarians during the Summer Holidays, three sets of index-cards (subject index, author index and title index) for over 17,000 books are now complete. In addition, a set of Chinese books index-cards (also in three indices) is ready for use too.

So as to encourage Science studies, we have ordered a great number of books on Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Astronomy, Mathematics, Geology and Geography. The Arts have not felt quite so urgent a need of replenishment, but they have not been neglected. Our collection of finely illustrated books on Art and allied subjects is a highlight of the library.

The number of books on accession in September, 1962 was 17,384.

The School Magazine

The second issue of "The Fig Tree" has been well received, mainly on account of the high quality of its illustrations. Our strong team of student-photographers are a help here; pupils took all the group-photographs. Not all of the photo-supplement has been contributed from the school, as it is our custom to include all the prize-winning prints from the inter-school contest which King's College originated and still runs.

As a chronicle of the school life the magazine has no equal, but it also serves to bring out budding literary talent. The second number of the "Tree" is up to standard regarding pupils' contributions.

Quiz

Another exciting series of inter-school quiz matches was viewed by television fans, and found our team ready (for the most part) with the required answer. Only in the final round did "the present state of our knowledge" prove a shade below that of the rival team, D.G.S. And so we had, for the second time running, to be content with second place. This year a diligent study of encyclopedias has been observed in the school library.

Societies and Clubs

Chinese Literature Society

This new society was formed early in the school year at the request of many senior students, and is flourishing. Regular meetings have been held and outside lecturers invited.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1961 - 1962

This School

King's College was founded in 1926, and one year later began to occupy the present building. Through damage due to World War II the school was closed from December, 1941 to September, 1950, when it was reopened as a primary school of 400 pupils. In the following year it became a secondary school, and two phases of extensions have enlarged the building to a greater size than it was in pre-war days.

A Government grammar school using English as the medium of instruction, the College has over 1,000 pupils, almost all of whom are Chinese and the great majority boys. The school course leads to the English School Certificate, the Matriculation Examination of the Hong Kong University and the London G.C.E.

From the Diary

Outstanding event: the Land Use and Minerals Symposium held at the College in September, 1961. The star of the distinguished gathering was Professor Dudley Stamp, who met many of the staff and stirred up great enthusiasm.

Speech Day was held on 30th November, when Professor and Mrs. S. G. Davis were the guests-of-honour.

As in previous years, the College's Photographic Club sponsored the inter-school annual competition, which ended with the 3-day exhibition in the school hall from 16th March.

Open Day was held on 27th April, and the exhibitions and science demonstrations which went with it continued over the weekend. The enthusiasm of staff and pupils was responsible for the success of the whole undertaking. The names of 1,537 visitor appear in the book, but this figure does not include a large number of others who were too modest to sign.

Sports and games: The Swimming Sports in October and the Athletic Sports in December, 1961 were held in ideal weather. The Challenge Cup for Table Tennis was won for the third time since 1952. If success in other inter-school competitions has not been spectacular, a determined start has been made to provide the training needed to win more laurels than we have in the past.

For the first time we have played host to the Annual Chess Tournament, begin only a year ago, between the schools and colleges of Hong Kong. Runners-up to the H.K.U. last year, this July we have managed to carry off both the team and the individual trophies.

Age Group

At the beginning of the year the average age of our Form r pupils is 12.10, and that of Form Upper Sixth 19.7. These ages remain fairly constant, although a small proportion of pupils are older than the average by reason of repetition.

This growth has, in the main, been due to an influx of junior pupils from the disbanded Yaumati and Wantsai Schools, most of whom have now reached the School Certificate year.

Girls have joined the school in Form 4 or above to receive a science education, if their former school could not provide it. Most of them were pupils of Belilios Public School.

Attendance and Health

Average attendance during the year was 98.4%.

The two regular full medical inspections took place; the school health was found to be generally sound. There were 3 cases of infectious disease during the year.

With the advent of the epidemic, a large number of pupils were inoculated against cholera.





Membership: The register shows a total of 531 members. With a view to admitting present students of the College into the Association, a new kind of membership known as Student Membership has been instituted. So far 31 boys have joined. Greater efforts still need to be made to enlist the support of this category of members, and by this means to bring new blood into the Association.

K.C.O.B.A. Primary School: Since its inauguration in September, 1960, the K.C.O.B.A. Primary School has been progressing smoothly. A total of 47 teachers and 1,530 pupils attend its three sessions. 17 candidates sat and passed the last Secondary Schools Entrance Examination. 

Religious Societies

Among the Catholic Society's activities, monthly Mass, talks, films and social occasions have featured. There have been two changes of Spiritual Director: Father Cronin gave place to Father Butterfield, who in turn acceded to Father Joseph Lee.

A serious attempt is being made to arouse in the members of both societis an interest in charitable work. At present the school's effort in this direction is almost confined to flag-selling, which is carried out by rotation of Houses.

The most notable event of the year was the opening of the K.C.O.B.A. Primary School on 10th March by Dr. Crozier, shortly before his retirement as Director of Education. 24 junior scouts from King's College assisted at the function. The modern 4-floor building is in Bridges Street, a crowded district badly in need of schools, and its twelve classrooms include in three sessions 1740 pupils. This undertaking of five years did not span the life of the Old Boys' Night School which, as Dr. Crozier reminded the guests, had opened in 1950 at the mother-school where it had operated for 10 years. Nothing could provide a finer example of service to the community for the present boys (and girls!) of King's College.

More recent news from the Primary School is that a gratifying measure of success attended the entry of Class 6 pupils for the Joint Primary 6 Examination. Also, a number of the teaching staff, G.T.C. trained, are post-war Old Boys. This revives the question, brought up last year, of a closer liason between the older and younger sets of ex-pupils; the Committee has plans for a positive attack on the problem.

Library

A display rack for magazines has been specially designed for the school and is a marked improvement.

Some 3,000 new books, pamphlets and periodicals have been added to the stock of the library since September, 1960. About half of them were handed over by our former Branch School at Wanchai. The rest were ordered from UK or purchased locally out of the Sports and Library Fund. The number of book in possession in September, 1961 was 16,428.

It is very satisfactory to see pupils flooding into the library every of during the lunch hour. The number of books loaned out each day now is not than the number loaned per week two years ago.

The organization, the classification system and the borrowing procedure of or library are now almost of the standard of a modern public library though we have neither full-time staff nor a clerk in charge of the library work.

School Magazine

This year the magazine has taken on a new look and a new name. Friendly rivalry has played its part, the fact that most of our contemporaries have names acting as a spur to us to adopt one. The dual function of a school magazine, to record events and to give the pupils expression, has been in mind when compiling the number-one issue of "The Fig Tree", but as a first attempt its blemishes call for the reader's indulgence.

The magazine has had a wider circulation this year, and no less than five of its student-contributors have found themselves answering fan mail from overseas.

Geography Society

Three expeditions were organised, one to Kowloon Peak, one to the Shing Moon Gorge and the third to Victoria Peak; and three visits made, two to the Royal Observatory and one to the China Dyeing Facory.

Two lectures illustrated by colour-slides were given; one by Mr. G. S. Coxhead on 'Grossing the Date Line', and the other by Mr. David Lai, Demonstrator of the Department of Geography, H.K.U., on 'The Ma On Shan Iron Mine'.

A Relief Model of the Hong Kong Harbour was made and a number of good films of geographical interest were also seen. All activities were keenly attended by both Senior and Junior members.

Art Club

The Club was very active this year. Some of the important events are listed below:—

- (r) Poster Competition - - A poster, designed by a student of F.5, won 3rd prize in the poster contest of the "Agricultural Show, 1961".
- (2) Art Lecture - - - In May, a lecture was given by Mr. M. F. Griffith, the Inspector of Art, to the members of the Club.
- (3) Art Exhibition - - The Annual Art Exhibition was held on the first five days of July. A great variety of work was shown in the school hall, including murals, paper mosaics, designs, drawings and paintings. More than three hundred visitors attended.
- (4) The H.K.U. Art Club Exhibition The Club contributed 14 pictures to the 3rd Annual Exhibition of the H.K.U. Art Club, and three of them took prizes.

Photographic Club

This is a year to remember! The reason:—

- (i) Membership increased from So to 110.
- (2) The darkroom was made full use of by members of the Club.
- (3) Lectures and demonstrations were given by well-known Hong Kong photographers, namely Mr. Manly Chin, F.R.P.S. and Mr. Kwan Tai Chi, F.R.P.S.
- (4) The 6th Hong Kong Annual Students' Photographic Contest sponsored by the Club took place in March, 1961. We "scooped the pool" by winning two 1st prizes, one 2nd prize and two 3rd prizes.

Among the Upper Sixth results on the last page there are 6 distinctions in Chemistry, not recorded is a distinction in Georgraphy at Advanced Level for a candidate who sat the subject from the Lower Sixth. In the junior school Fan Yat Kwong deserves mention for the number and variety of his successes — however, you will shortly be seeing him and the other prize-winners on this platform.

House Activities were in abeyance through the time of the extensions but they are in full force now. Competition in all school games and sports goes on through the year and is not by any means confined to Sports Day. The six Houses are named after past Principals, and Mr. Leung Fung Ki, who was our Chairman last year, is one of the few people who retain vivid memories of all of them. I shall no easily forget his account of his first meeting with Mr. Morris, the first Principal, in September 1927. Mr. Leung, a brand-new member of the Department, had been instructed to report to King's College, but no time had been stated. The Principal glared at him and observed, "You're late, Mr. Leung!" In this talk I have referred by name to certain teachers. With a staff of 42 one cannot mention one teacher without excluding 41 others. But I include every member when I thank you all for your loyal support at all times throughout the year.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1960 - 1961

From the Diary

Early in the school year, on 23rd September 1960, Mr. C. W. Sargison went on leave pending retirement and Mr. G. S. Coxhead took over the duties of Principal.

The next two months saw an informal visit by Dr. D. J. S. Crozier, shortly to retire as Director of Education, and a successful swimming gala. Mr. F. K. Leung, a former Principal, took the chair at Speech Day on 8th December, when The Right Reverend R. O. Hall, Bishop of Hong Kong, was guest-speaker and Mrs. Hall gave away the prizes.

Soon after the School Sports and Half-Yearly Tests, in early March Census Week came to crown a spell of furious activity for more than 100 pupils, which bad begun with intensive training several months earlier. The opening of the Old Boys Primary School during the same week is referred to late in this bulletin. March, 1961 was also the month of the Musical Festival when we took several second places; when we were runners-up in the inter-school T. V. Quiz Contest and won two first prizes in the inter-school Photographic Competition. That does not end the record of this memorable month: a pupil, Wong Chun Bong, won the Commowealth Essay first prize for Hong Kong schools and Mr. S. G. Wong, our adviser on photography, was elected an Associate of the Royal Photographic Society.

In April a cherished dream was realised with the opening of a canteen, a facility which had been lacking for four years.

During the next couple of months we were, as usual, preoccupied with examinations; but July brought the Art Exhibition and 300 visitors, the new school magazine, "The Fig Tree" and the winding-up of term. Curriculum

The

Owing to the small number of pupils wishing to follow a course of Arts, these pupils have again had to leave us for other schools. The two divisions of Form Lower 6 which emerged worked to the same curriculum as that of the year before, namely. English Language, Chinese Language, Translation, Geography, Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry and Biology. The two classes of Upper 6 followed courses aimed at entry to the Hong Kong University in the Science and Medical Faculties respectively.



Membership of the Association is still largely confined to the "pre-war vintage". But a thriving community has emerged from out of the post-war graduates, and efforts are being directed to fuse these youngsters with the older set rather than have two separate societies of O.B.'s, however different their interests.

The new classrooms, unlike the pre-existing ones, are all large and of uniform dimensions. The new laboratories have gained space by the avoidance of passages, each room possessing its own door to a stairway. Features of the extension are the exceptionally large library (1,800 square feet), an up-to-date geography room and a cheerful art room looking on to the Harbour.

Demands upon accommodation by outside bodies have continued to be heavy. The Government Clerical Service, the Auxiliary Medical Service, the Police Reserve, the Civil Aid Services and the St. John's Ambulance Division of the Old Boys Association have used certain premises regularly each week, and the hall has served its customary purpose in accommodating public examinations.

The K.C.O.B.A. Night School vacated the College in July 1960, moving to its completed new premises at Bridges Street.

Students in Training

Due to difficulties imposed by the building of extensions, the number of students doing their teaching practice in the school was limited to two. They were Diploma students of Hong Kong University.

Activities

Many of the school's outside interests are organised on a club or society basis, and the reports of these clubs follow. There are also activities of the "open to all" variety, including visual displays, lunchtime gramophone concerts and films. All have been pursued as often as the difficult circumstances would allow.

A concern for the welfare of the community has been shown by voluntary flag sellers, whose work has been organised through a roster of Houses.

Library

Reconstruction of the building included the moving of the Library from a smallish room in the South Wing to the very large new one it now occupies. This and the addition of over 1,000 books involved Mr. H. T. Shu and his many helpers in a great deal of work, and it was not until the academic year had almost run out that the new Library came into commission.

With over 16,000 books and a large stock of magazines, it is now one of the finest school libraries in the Colony.

School Magazine

The July, 1960, issue is one of considerable interest and mirrors the life and occupations of the school. It brings out pupils' ability to profit by excursions and lectures such as that of Mr. Jack Braga on the Colony's history. There is a fine artistic and photographic section. The Editor, Mr. S. W. Rainbird, who has now left the staff, is to be congratulated on a magazine well above the average of such publications.

History Society

The six lecture-meetings held were well-attended, Mr. Jack Braga's talk on "Hong Kong through the Years' proving very popular. Films and film-strips have also entertained the members.

Geography Society

An active year has been passed, and not only by senior school members; a junior branch has been formed.

Several interesting lectures were given, and talent among the staff was not overlooked — both Mr. Holmes and Mr. Whiteley (now left) and Mr. Atkinson showed fine colour-slides to illustrate their lectures on "places foreigneering". A number of good films were also seen.

Expeditions to Cheung Chau (twice), to the Shing Mun gorge and to north-east Lantao helped greatly to increase our first-hand acquaintance with the local scene, and contributed to the aim of making our geography less bookish.

Art Club

Regular meetings were held each Saturday morning, and lunchtime sessions during February and March provided extra practice for School Certificate candidates. Sketching excursions were made to Cheung Chau and other scenic spots.

Mr. M. F. Griffith, Art Inspector, gave a lecture to senior pupils on painting and drawing.

The school contributed works to two exhibitions during the year, and gained seven honour certificates presented by the University Art Society.

Photographic Club

The Club has held a highly successful year, in spite of the fact that the dark room was not available during the autumn term.

The annual exhibition open to all schools and sponsored by the Club itself, was held in April. The Club won 2nd and 3rd prizes and a number of honour certificates.

Three students in open competitions won cash prizes and a silver medal.

The staff adviser, Mr. Wong Shiu Gun, is a valuable asset to the Club, being an expert photographer himself.

Music

Four choirs were organised: Junior, Intermediate, Senior English and Senior Chinese. These choirs and six choral speaking groups competed, together with our harmonica players, in numerous events of the Schools Musical Festival, 1960, and

Attendance and Health

Average attendance during the year was 97%.

The school was medically inspected and inoculations given at parents' request.

General Remarks

In September, 1959, the beginning of the year under review, major extensions to the school were in progress. Their completion had been expected before this date, and in consequence the Branch School at Queen's Road East had been closed and its pupils transferred to the main school. Their accommodation offered considerable difficulty. It involved an organisation of three overlapping sessions, and a curtailment of the total possible enrolment by some fifty pupils. Thus the figure of 909 pupils for September, 1959, stands against the September, 1960 roll of 960 pupils.

The extensions had been handed over to the school by early December, 1959, but it was not until the end of that month that the necessary re-wiring was completed. The next few months saw the furnishing and equipment of the new premises, which were not in full use until the close of the academic year.

The size and scope of the additions are not apparent to the passer-by in Bonham Road. They are an entirely upward development, bringing the frontage to four storeys and the gymnasium wing to three. Details will be found further on in this report; here it is noted that the extensions include extra classrooms and special rooms, and bring the number of laboratories to seven. There are a classrooms, the largest number possessed by any Government Secondary School.

Curriculum

A general education is given from Form 1 to Form 5, the subjects taught being English Language and Literature, Chinese Language, Chinese Literature and History, Translation, Oral Kwo Yu, Geography, History, Civics, Pure Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Art, Music and Physical Education.

In the Lower Sixth Form the emphasis is on Science, and the subjects History. Civics and Art are dropped. The trend is still plainer in the case of the Upper Sixth, where the entire 40 periods of the week are devoted to scientific and mathematical subjects. However, Physical Education and Music, and with some senior classes Art also, are taught on an extra-curricular basis.

Enrolment

On 31/12/59 the number of pupils on the roll was 907, comprising 901 boys and 6 girls.

Recruitment for Form r was, as usual, determined by the results of the Joint Primary 6 Examination. Form 2 was filled partly by the pupils of the Branch School, disbanded in August, 1959, and partly by pupils from Yaumati School. This form of six divisions was the largest in the school.

Art students of Forms Upper and Lower 6 were transferred to Queen's College and Queen Elizabeth School.

Staff

At the beginning of January, 1960, there were 39 full-time members of the teaching staff, two clerks and two laboratory assistants.

The number of prefects and sub-prefects was increased to 30 to cope with the larger school population (663 to 909). They coped well with difficulties which put a severe strain on the whole school.

The New Principal

Mr. Coxhead comes of a teaching family, his father having been the headmaster of a grammar school in England and his mother also a teacher. Educated at Oundle School, Liverpool and London Universities, he entered the profession in 1935 when he joined the staff of the Cathedral High School, Bombay on a 4-year contract.

After a short experience of English schools he was accepted into the Colonial Service and made his first acquaintance with this school in January, 1940. Called up when war broke out, he was a war-prisoner in Japan and returned to Hong Kong in March, 1947.

Since then Mr. Coxhead has had a wide and varied experience both of schools and of administrative work. Four years were shared between K.G.V. School and Queen's College, and after home leave he became an inspector of schools, a post he retained for six years; for two of these he had charge of the grant-in-aid schools. At the end of 1957, after an "absence" of 16 years, he rejoined King's College and acted for his predecessor, Mr. C. W. Sargison, during the latter's leave.

Geography is Mr. Coxhead's special subject, in which he has contributed to the production of a local atlas and written (with Mr. J. Whiteley, a former staff-member) a junior textbook.
