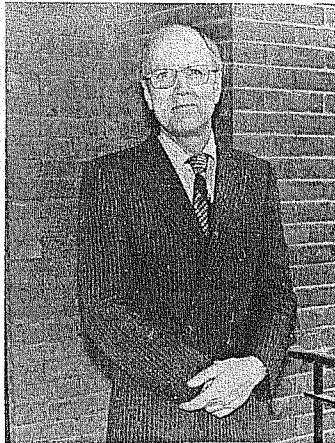

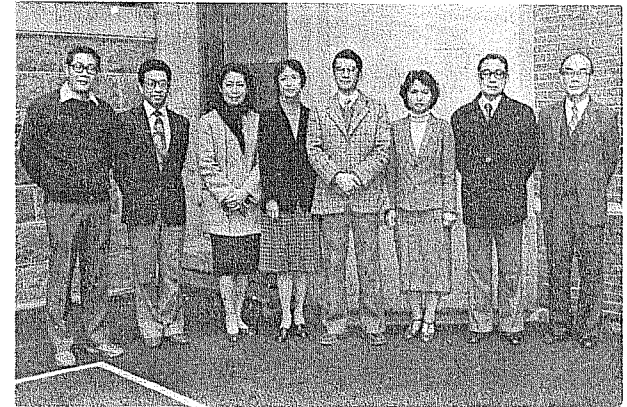

## FAREWELL MR. HARRISON

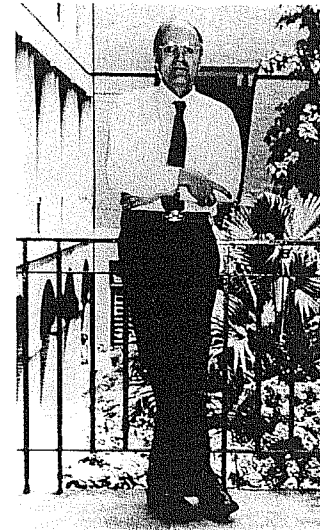

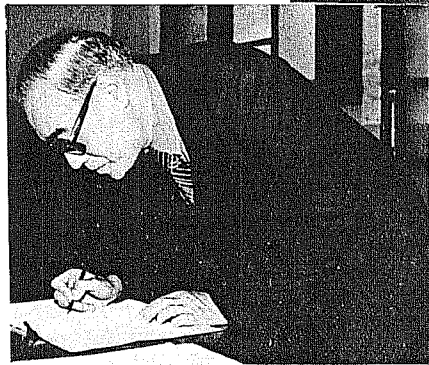


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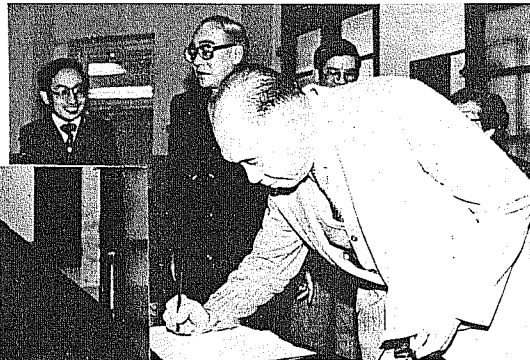

## KING'S COLLEGE SPEECH DAY, 4TH MARCH, 1982 Principal's Speech and Presentation of the Annual Report (1980-1981)

Mr. YUNG Yi-yin, Mrs. YUNG, Dr. KWAN Lai-hung, Ladies and Gentlemen:

On behalf of the staff and pupils of King's College I have much pleasure in welcoming you all here this evening to our Annual Speech Day. It is also my pleasure to extend a very special welcome to you Mr. YUNG, our Guest Speaker, and Mrs. YUNG who has kindly consented to present the scholarships and prizes.

Mr. YUNG's presence among us this evening is in reality a home-coming. For it should be recalled that Mr. YUNG was a member of the staff at King's College from 1928 to 1941. Then at later stage in his career Mr. YUNG taught at Clementi Middle School where he was appointed Vice-Principal in 1954. From 1955 onwards he was Headmaster of several Government Primary Schools. After his retirement from Government Service he still served in the field of education. Besides being the Principal of Pui Chung College he also gave lectures for the In-Service Course for Teacher-Training and in the Department of Extra-Mural Studies of Hong Kong University.

Mr. YUNG is an acknowledged expert in drama and speech education. He has been a regular adjudicator in the Inter-School Drama Competition and the Music and Speech Festival. He is the author of several books on Chinese prose and verse reading.

In 1980 he was awarded the Medal of Honour by Her Majesty the Queen.

I take this opportunity to welcome the new President of the K.C.O.B.A., Dr. KWAN Lai-hung. Dr. KWAN is an active and enthusiastic member of the K.C.O.B.A., having been serving as Secretary and Vice-President for a number of years. We all wish him a fruitful term of office in promoting the interests of the association and the School. I also wish to pay tribute to Mr. Peter CHAN who has continuously been President of the K.C.O.B.A. since 1973. His long term of office reflects the sincere and sustained interest he has taken in the welfare of his old school and the Old Boys' Association.

Copies of the Annual Report for 1980-81 have already been distributed to you. I hope you will spare a few minutes of your time to browse through it at your own convenience.

On the academic side results in the public examination have been creditable. In the Hong Kong Advanced Level Examination (1981) we entered 107 pupils achieving 94 distinctions and 202 credits, showing an increase of 18 distinctions as compared with those of the previous year. It is worth mentioning that in 8 subjects our pupils'

results reflected a 100 per cent passing rate, and in 9 subjects credits or distinctions were gained by over 50 per cent of the pupils sitting for these subjects.

In the H.K.C.E. Examination we entered 171 candidates and scored 161 distinctions and 522 credits. A high academic standard was again maintained.

The introduction of Principles of Accounts to the school curriculum marked a significant innovation in the year under review. The purpose of introducing this subject is to cater for a wider range of pupils' interests and potentialities. For the same reason we are considering the possibility of introducing the subject of computer science provided that teachers and the necessary facilities become available. Computer science has already engaged the keen interest of pupils. To foster this interest, gifts have been donated to our very active Computer Club. I refer to the generous donations of the 'Genie I Computer System' by Dr. WONG Hau-ki and the 'Superboard II Computer System' by Auto Business Computer Ltd.

Besides these two donations by old boys of King's College, I must on behalf of the pupils record our thanks to Mr. Gilbert HO, another old boy of King's College, who has established the HO Kam Scholarship in honour of his father. This is the second scholarship Mr. HO has donated to his Alma Mater.

Regarding extra-curricular activities I would like to refer to some of our successes during the past academic year. Our pupils participated in the 33rd Hong Kong School Music Festival and achieved remarkable results. Our Harmonica Band won the first position and was awarded the "Matthew Hohner Cup", while the Harmonica Ensemble was awarded the "Sherley Shield" in perpetuity. Moreover our pupils won ten individual prizes in the Harmonica Solos. Our Chinese Instrumental Group also gained three first prizes and three second prizes.

We have also had commendable results in Sports. In the Inter-School Volleyball Competition (Division 1) our A grade team retained the championship and our C grade team came second. In the Inter-School Athletics Competition our C grade team came second.

In closing I wish to thank the old boys who have contributed in so many ways to the well-being of the school during the past years.

At this point I would like to pay tribute to all the teaching staff, the laboratory staff, the office clerks and the minor staff for their untiring efforts during the past year. I feel I must include a special word of thanks to our Senior Masters, Mr. P.J. HARRISON and Mr. S.Y. POON for their valuable service to the school. My sincere gratitude is also due to those masters who gave up much of their summer vacation in carrying out essential tasks and in preparing for the new academic year.

I would also like to thank the Head-Prefect, Vice-Head Prefects and the Prefect Body as a whole as well as the student librarians for their valuable service.

And now I have great pleasure in requesting Mrs. YUNG to present the scholarships and prizes.

#### IMPORTANT EVENTS OF THE YEAR

Speech Day: 19th December, 1980

The Guest-of-Honour was Mr. Frank K.C. WONG, Assistant Principal Crown Counsel, and Mrs. WONG presented the scholarships and prizes. Other guests included former staff, old boys and girls, and friends from the Education Department.

Open Day: 19th February, 1981

The Open Day was one of the highlights in the activities of King's College. It demonstrated not only the talents but also the genuine zeal of the teachers and pupils. A highly varied exhibition was held in the school hall, making hundreds of visitors fascinated. The high quality of the exhibits aroused favourable comments and encouraging appreciation from many quarters.

The school had 34 classes consisting of 5 streams for Form 1, 2, 4 and 5 and 6 streams for Form 3 and 4 streams for Form Lower and Upper Six. Students are offered a broad general education before they specialize in arts or science in Form Lower 6. Form 5 students were given reasonable freedom to choose their subjects and most of them took at least eight subjects in the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination.

Class division in Form 6 remained the same. The four streams in Form 6 included one Arts, one Mathematics and two Biology.

Cultural education and physical training are of prime importance to a well-balanced education. Thus from Form 1 to Form 6, physical education was offered twice in a cycle while music was taught up to Form 3 and Art was taught up to Form 4. Though the two cultural subjects were not included in the curricula of Form 5 and 6, senior students were encouraged to take an active role in many activities organized by the Music Association and the Art Club in which they could explore their musical talents or refine their artistic skills. Their distinguished achievements in the Art Competition and School Music Festival were highly commendable.

### PREFECT

The Prefects were selected from Form 4, 5 and 6, working in consultation with the Principal, Discipline Masters and Senior members of the staff. They helped in maintaining the discipline of the school, and caring for and guiding their fellow students. When the regular prefects were released from duties to prepare for examinations, their places were taken up by other students selected from Form 4 and Form Lower 6.

### THE LITERARY SIDE

'The Fig Tree 80-81', the school magazine, was published in spite of technical difficulties. The main theme was on the growth and development of the school as reflected in school life. It presented a concise but realistic picture of the main events of the year and recorded a wide variety of activities organized by the clubs and societies in the school.

Two issues of 'The Bridge', the school newspaper, was published during the academic year. The newspaper fulfilled its role by giving a profile of the high lights of the school functions and featuring interesting articles from students.

To promote students' interest in extensive reading and independent research, the library is well stocked with varied reading materials. Every effort has been made to improve the library, making it an ideal place for cultural pursuits and self-education. Old books were disposed of, and new books recommended by the teaching staff were added. The total number of books in English was 23850 and Chinese books numbered 6830 making a total of 26680.

### THE RELIGIOUS SIDE

The school does not give any formal religious instruction but there are three societies organizing religious activities for and giving spiritual guidance to the pupils. The Christian Fellowship and the Catholic Society held regular meetings and morning prayers. Other activities included Bible studies, hymn-singing, talks, discussions, film and slides shows. The Buddhist Association also organized activities such as talks and discussions.

### CAREER GUIDANCE AND EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES

Vocational guidance was given due attention. Working alongside the Careers Section of the Education Department, valuable information on studies abroad and local employment opportunities was posted up on the careers notice-board. Students were counselled to orientate themselves in society when they leave school. The careers talks and visits to careers exhibitions arranged were geared to this end. Above all the much sought for individual counselling was offered by the careers master.

### GUIDANCE AND COUNSELLING SERVICE

Our school has joined the School Social Work Scheme jointly organized by the Education and Social Welfare Department for two years already. A school social worker, Miss CHEUNG, came to the school every Monday afternoon to assist students with problems which might hinder their development academically, socially, emotionally and otherwise.

### STUDENT CAREERS

#### Upper 6

Among the 107 upper six students who completed the Matriculation course, 64 were admitted to the University of Hong Kong. Our students' interest in and potentialities for science and medical studies are revealed by the following statistics:-

One student was admitted to the Chinese University of Hong Kong, 15 enrolled at the Hong Kong Polytechnic and other post secondary institutes, while 2 students went abroad for further studies. Thirteen repeated Form Upper 6 in other schools and 11 began to work.

#### Lower 6

8 gained entry to the Chinese University of Hong Kong and 2 proceeded outside Hong Kong for further studies.

#### The Duke of Edingburgh's Award Scheme

The scheme aims at the mental and physical development of young people in Hong Kong, to provide recreation in the encouragement of interests and to provide training in leadership and self-discipline in various sports. Activities included Physical Efficiency, Expedition and participation in the Primary Student Guidance Service organised by the Western District Community Centre. In the Joint School Orienteering Competition, our school came third.

#### Folk Dance Club

This is a young but fast-growing club. It became well-known to students by a fantastic playground performance in October, which had never appeared in the lengthy history of King's. The club was warmly supported by the fellow members who showed a regular attendance at the gatherings held weekly in the gymnasium. Members were invited to participate in the gatherings held by St. Mary Canossian College and Beilios Public School during the Christmas Holidays.

#### Gardening Club

Club members dutifully fulfilled their role as the preservers of the natural beauty of our school garden for the better enjoyment of fellow students and teachers. Apart from the routine gardening activities, a quiz on flower photographs was held.

#### Geography Society

The society launched a series of successful activities which included visits to the Royal Observatory and the Swire Bottle Company Limited, film and slide shows, the 'Pollution in Shatin' project for the Open Day and the informative board display on "Rocks in Hong Kong, their formations and characteristics" in the Geography Room. The society also encouraged members to participate in the Joint Society Orienteering and the Joint Society Social Gathering.

#### Handicraft and Woodwork Club

The club is divided into four sections: the military model group, the model-making group, the sculpture section and the newest woodwork section. Regular instructions were given to the interested members every week. On the Open Day, the club displayed many of the members' attractive works in the Hall such as a paper sculpture of the club's badge, the first book cabinet of the club and many plastic models. If one passes by the Woodwork Club and hears banging and clanging, it's not World War III, but club members' working on their creations.

#### History Society

The society organised a Cave Painting Competition for the first formers at the beginning of the term. The outstanding work of the competition and the project on the 'Work of Art' of early man were exhibited on our school Open Day. Film shows, cross-word puzzle competition and a quiz for F.1 and F.2 were also organised in response to the enthusiastic interest shown by students in these activities.

#### Junior Red Cross - Cadet Unit 21

To act according to the motto "Serve one another", the Junior Red Cross played an active role in the school Annual Athletic Meet and Open Day. Cadets joined the training courses organised by the headquarters on first aid, hygiene, nursing, standard resuscitation, basic drilling and others; as well as undertaking regular and special service. Cadets were also invited by other units to their social gatherings and friendly matches.

#### Music Association

One of the largest clubs in the school, with widely-felt influence, the Music Association held numerous functions throughout the academic year. These included a number of concerts such as Hi-Fi concerts and the end-of-term concert, the well-supported Junior and Senior Forms Singing Contests, Guitar, Harmonica and Chinese Instrumental Training Course and participation in the Music Festival.

#### Pen-Pal Club

The members communicate with pen-pals all over the world. This helps to nurture friendship, increase knowledge of other cultures and customs as well as to obtain a deeper understanding of humanity.

#### Photographic Club

The club ran regular training courses on Darkroom techniques as well as basic photographic techniques to give members an opportunity to improve their skills in this respect. A visit to Kodak Film Processing Company and a lecture were held. Owing to the efforts of the club members, the Open Day Project, 'Close Up Photography', entertained many guests and students.

#### Rambling Club

The Club's activities were marked by the many outings organised for nature-lovers to the many scenic spots throughout Hong Kong. Places visited included Nam She Tau, San Sin Chek, Needle Hill, Wong Ngau Shan and Ma On Shan. The club also participated actively in the Joint Society Orienteering in December.

#### Scouts - 5th H.K. Group

Scouting is for the individual who is willing to live up to a code and to undertake certain obligations in return for adventurous activities, a sense of achievement and belonging, fun and service to the community. The scout members actively attended regular Saturday meetings, outings, gatherings with other scout units and guide companies; as well as scouting courses held by the Scout Association in Canoe Building, Rock Climbing and Boatmanship, and rendering service on various school functions.

#### Science Society

King's College students, scientifically inclined, gave enthusiastic support to the wide range of activities organised by the society's four sub-sections: Biology Circle, Astronomy Section, Electronics and Wireless Sections, Physics-Chemistry-Mathematics Section. Under the Central Committee's efficient direction, the Society offered inter-class quiz competitions, project making competitions, star observation, film and slide shows, experiments, dissection and specimen making, lectures, tuition groups, a library, visits and publication of the Science Companion. The Society participated in the Joint School Science Exhibition and won the prize of "Best Individual Project".

#### Stamp Club

In order to promote interest in philately, the club organised a cross-word puzzle, a junior form philatelic quiz, a lecture, a visit to the General Post Office and meetings for stamp exchanging among the members. The club also provided its more than 50 members with stamp exchange facilities, the supply of stamp magazines and reference books as well as assistance in the purchase of First Day Covers and Stamps.

**Form 5**

Out of a total of 171 students who sat for the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination, 77 continued their studies in Form Lower 6 in this school and 45 in other schools. 11 repeated Form 5 in this school and 11 repeated Form 5 in other schools. One enrolled at the Hong Kong Polytechnic, 1 at a post-secondary college and 1 enrolled in a Technical Institute. Four proceeded outside Hong Kong for further studies and 7 began to work.

The above figures show that the majority of our students were enthusiastic in pursuing further academic studies, either locally or abroad. Only a small percentage entered employment.

**Form 3**

236 Form 3 students participated in the 1980/81 Junior Secondary Education Assessment, and the result of the allocation of aided Form 4 places was as follows:-

228 students were allocated back to this school and 8 were allocated to other schools.

**EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES AND SOCIETIES**

Great emphasis has been placed on the wide-ranging extra-curricular activities as an essential in the character-moulding of an all-round individual. The school plays a guiding and encouraging role through the provision of ample opportunities for students to develop their hobbies and interests outside the classroom. Under the supervision and guidance of teacher advisers, each individual student can explore and develop his intellectual and physical potentials, to display his initiative and co-operational ability as the organisation of clubs and societies are in the hands of pupils themselves.

**Art Club**

With the ever-zealous support of Art enthusiasts throughout the school, the club has maintained its popularity. The centre of all creative activities can be found in the Art Room, home of four interest-groups, namely the Plastic, Screen-print, Etching and Drawing groups. The inter-class Christmas Board Display Competition in December lent a festive atmosphere to the school. In February, the Open Day Art Club counter gained popular appreciation owing to the substantial efforts of the club members. Other well-run club activities included lectures on photo-screen printing technique, a Christmas Card Design Competition and the Art Quiz for F.2 to F.4 students.

**Bridge Club**

Contract Bridge has carried itself a permanent place in established popularity with the enrolment of 218 members this year, owing to its appeal as a highly intellectual game which demands the amalgamation of logical deduction with strong and wide-ranging imagination. The Club ran weekly free practices on Thursday after school, regular tournament such as Open Team-of-four, Open Pair and Inter-class Team-of-Four tournaments.

**Buddhist Association**

The Association welcomes students of all denominations to join in the discussion and study of Buddhism. Club activities included visits to various monasteries, a picnic to Aberdeen Country Park, two lectures and discussions as well as two issues of the student bulletin and a library.

**Canoe Club**

Canoeing is an exciting and extremely challenging sport, which puts one's physical endurance and strength to the test. All members have to pass a swimming test, a safeguarding measure for the club's water activities. The club held several outings for Forms 3, 4 and Lower 6 students who found tremendous enjoyment and excitement in such activities.

**Catholic Society**

The society aims at offering spiritual guidance to fellow schoolmates who are seeking for the real meaning of life and a better understanding of God. Daily morning prayers, regular discussions and study groups to communicate, share and learn more about the Catholic faith as well as hymn singing and occasional Scripture readings were conducted. On the first Friday of every month, a Mass was held for society members. In March, the society joined the 'Save the Children Project' organised by the Save The Children Federation by donating US\$16 every month to sponsor the daily needs of an African child.

**Chess Club**

Chess, be it International, Chinese or Go chess, has always had a substantial following amongst students of King's College. The very high standard of Chess reached in the school, comparable to the very best outside of the school, is reflective of accumulated experience gained by regular free practices, training courses and regular tournaments run by the club. In external tournaments, the club practically achieved an outstanding performance when awarded champion in the International Chess Competition and War Game as well as second in the Inter-school Chinese Chess Competition.

**Chinese Literature Society**

To promote the students' interest and raise the standard of Chinese in King's College, the society organised a wide range of activities such as Mandarin phonetic classes, essay and Chinese debating contests, bulletin board display and a talk by Mr. KWOK, our former Chinese teacher.

**Christian Fellowship**

It aims at spreading the message of Christ to all students within the school. Regular activities included talks, Bible studies, slide shows, films, group activities and prayer meetings. An evangelistic meeting jointly organised with other schools in Western District was held in December. In March, there was a talk by some ex-drug addicts from Dawn Island to witness God's changing of their life.

**Civics Society**

To promote the interest of the students towards their society and to acquaint them with the people and place they live in, the society successfully arranged two excursions to the Regent Hotel and South China Morning Post, as well as a picnic outside the school with the Geography Society. A film show on pollution and a quiz for F.3 - 5 students were held. Members also actively participated in the Open Day Project, Mass Media - Television.

**Computer Club**

The club was established in March 1981. The objective is to arouse the interest of students in the application of the computer and to boost the normalization of the computer in Hong Kong. Demonstration on computer application and a training course on basic computer concept and programme were held to mark the first two activities for the enthusiastic members, especially lower six students.

**Drama Society**

The society aims at encouraging the inner potential of each interested individual in related fields within drama production by offering them the opportunity to display their creative and artistic talents in the Annual School Production and Senior Form Drama Competition. Members were also encouraged to participate in the Joint School Drama Seminar in March. In May, the society organised a talk by LAI Huen, an experienced actress.



### St. John Ambulance Society

The society aims at providing its members with basic first-aid knowledge and training for the service of the community. Members participated in a wide range of activities such as regular meetings, joint meetings and programmes with other clubs and groups, picnics, social gatherings, training camps and the performing of duties at school and community functions. Our division gained the Championship among other nursing-divisions in the Clare Gallagher Home-nursing Competition and was the runner-up in the foot-drill Competition in the Sir Michael Hogan Competition.

### Sports Club

'A healthy mind is a healthy body', and a healthy body is best promoted by Sports. The Sports Club strives to raise the students' interest and standard in Sports, apart from advocating sportmanship. Activities included the organisation of inter-class friendly matches, inter-house competition, volleyball training course, Swimming Gala and Athletic Meet.

### Table-Tennis Club

Table tennis is a very popular game in the school, as King's College offers very adequate table tennis facilities: Regular practices and matches are training grounds for the selection of school teams. November to June are important calendar months when inter-house, inter-school and individual championship competitions are held.

## OUR PRINCIPAL

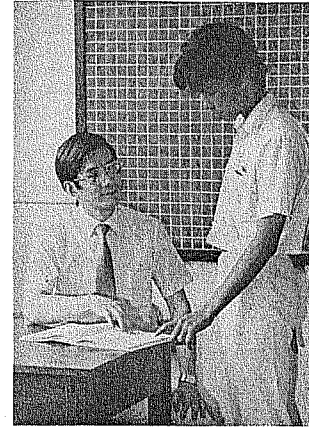

It is my wish that as they leave the school to take up their different responsible positions in the community, such good qualities will not diminish, but will bring respect to them, and honour to the school name."

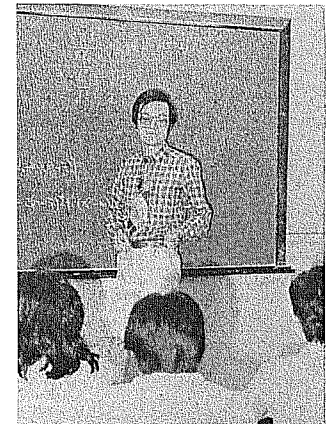

## KING'S COLLEGE Annual Speech Day 1983 Principal's Speech

Dr. Kwan Lai-hung, Mrs. Kwan, Ladies and Gentlemen :

On behalf of the staff and pupils of King's College, I have much pleasure in welcoming you all to our Annual Speech Day. In particular, I wish to extend a special welcome to Dr. Kwan Lai-hung, the President of the King's College Old Boys' Association, who has given up much of his precious time to come to our school this afternoon as our guest speaker; and also to Mrs. Kwan, who has kindly consented to present the scholarships and prizes.

Dr. Kwan has been an enthusiastic member of the K.C.O.B.A. since 1973, having served at different times as Hon. Secretary and Vice-President. He was elected the President last year. Throughout all these years, Dr. Kwan has maintained a close relationship with the school and has spared no effort in promoting the interests of the Association and the school. In August, 1982, Mrs. Kwan, the honourable mother of Dr. Kwan, donated a scholarship to the school in memory of her late husband, Mr. Kwan Ka-chuen. This generous gesture proves that the Kwan family has a deep concern for King's College.

At this point, I would like to thank the committee members of the K.C.O.B.A. as a whole. After several years of preparation and planning, the Association has set up a LEUNG Fung-ki Scholarship Fund, in honour of Mr. LEUNG Fung-ki, a former Principal of King's College. Under this Fund, scholarships totalling \$3,000 are awarded to pupils of Form Two to Form Upper Six as from this academic year.

The Annual Report for the academic year 1981-82 has been distributed to you. From this Report, you will get a full picture of the school life in King's College. I wish to touch upon several aspects of it, and to say a few words on what is going on in the current academic year.

On the academic side, the results in the public examinations have maintained the high standard of the school. We entered 103 pupils in the Hong Kong Advanced Level Examination, 1982, and obtained 91 distinctions and 195 credits. We entered 176 pupils in the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination and scored 339 distinctions and 571 credits. This represents an increase of 178 distinctions compared with 161 distinctions in the previous year.

Last year we had introduced Principles of Accounts to the school curriculum. Our aim is to cater for a wider range of pupils' interests and potentialities. In the current academic year, we have added Computer Studies to the time-table for Form Four, so that the pupils can have an even wider choice of subjects. We now have an air-conditioned computer-room with nine computers. Both of the newly introduced subjects are so popular that we cannot accept all the pupils who wish to study them.

The real aim of education does not solely lie on the academic side; pupils of King's College are repeatedly reminded that knowledge outside the classroom is important and valuable too. For this reason, the pupils of King's College are very active in organizing club activities. We have over thirty clubs and societies, the organization of which are chiefly in the hands of the pupils themselves under the supervision of teachers.

Among the various organized activities, the pupils have scored some outstanding achievements which, I feel, should not go unrecorded.

Art and music are two popular activities in King's College. Our pupils won the First Prize in both the "Portrait of Mother" Art Competition sponsored by Radio-Television Hong Kong and the "Mother's Day Drawing Competition" sponsored by the Social Welfare Department. They also won the Second Prize in "My Living Environment" Art Competition sponsored by the Education Department.

The results in the 34th Hong Kong Schools Music Festival were also gratifying. Our Harmonica Band was again the champion and was awarded for the second year the Mathew Hohner Cup. In the Harmonica Solo (Advanced Class), our pupils won both the first and the second prizes, and were awarded the Hohner Trophy. The Chinese Instrumental Group also gained high honours, winning two first prizes and three second prizes.

Our achievements in sports merit a special mention. In the Inter-School Life-Saving Competition, our A-grade Life-Saving Team was the champion and our school came second in the over-all results. Our C-grade Table-tennis Team and C-grade Volleyball Team were both second in inter-school competitions. Our Basket-ball Team came second in the "Fight Crime Campaign Inter-School Basket-ball Knock-out Competition" organized jointly by the Urban Services Department and the City District Office.

Moral Education has been the focus of attention in the education circle in recent years. I personally think that moral education is not something that can be taught efficiently in the classroom. It is rather something that has to be acquired in time.

It has been a tradition of King's College to prepare individuals for a complete and well-balanced life, individuals who not only possess knowledge but also have sound morality. This can be further illustrated by the founding of two new clubs this year, namely the Junior Police Call Club and the Social Service Group. The former aims at arousing social consciousness and the responsibility of the individuals towards society. The latter serves to promote love and understanding between our pupils and those who are less fortunate, through activities with the physically handicapped children at the John F. Kennedy Centre organised under the Sister School Scheme. It is through activities of this nature that moral education can be fostered.

Please allow me to quote two examples to explain to you how public-spirited our pupils are. Firstly, 156 pupils donated blood to the Hong Kong Red Cross in November, and secondly, about two hundred pupils took part in the "Walk for Millions" in December, raising approximately ten thousand dollars for the Community Chest. I am confident that the pupils of King's College are always ready to serve the community in and out of the school.

Before I conclude, I wish to pay tribute to all the teaching staff, the laboratory staff, the office clerks, the librarian and the minor staff for their untiring efforts during the past year. I feel I must include a special word of thanks to the Senior Masters, Mr. P.J. Harrison and Mr. S.Y. Poon for their loyalty and valuable services to the school. Mr. Harrison retired in June, 1982; he was succeeded by Mr. Y.W. Sun. My sincere gratitude is also due to those teachers who gave up much of their summer vacation in carrying out essential tasks and in preparing for the new academic year.

I would also like to thank the Head-Prefect, Vice-Headprefects and the Prefect Body as a whole, the scouts as well as the student librarians for their devoted services to the school.

And now I have great pleasure in requesting Mrs. Kwan to present the scholarships and prizes.

The school had 34 classes. Each of Form 1, Form 2, Form 3 and Form 5 was divided into 5 streams, Form 4 into 6 streams and Form 6 (Lower and Upper) into 4 streams. Students were offered a broad general education before they specialized in arts or science in Form Lower 6. Form five students were given reasonable freedom to choose their subjects and most of them took at least eight subjects in the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination.

Class division in Form 6 remained the same as in the previous year. There were one Arts class, one Mathematics class and two Biology classes.

Cultural education and physical training are of prime importance to a well-balanced education. Thus from Form 1 to Form 6, there were two physical education periods in a cycle. Music was taught up to Form 3 and art up to Form 5. Though the two cultural subjects were not included in the curricula of Form 5 and Form 6, senior students were encouraged to take an active role in the activities organized by the Music Association and the Art Club so that they could explore their musical talents or refine their artistic skills. Their distinguished achievements in the various Art competitions and in the Schools Music Festival were highly commendable.

**Prefect**

The Prefects were selected from among pupils of Form 4, Form 5 and Form 6. They worked under the guidance and supervision of the Principal, the Discipline Masters and other members of the staff. They helped in maintaining the discipline of the school. When the regular prefects were released from duties to prepare for examinations, their places were taken up by other students selected from Form 4 and Form Lower 6.

**The Literary Side**

'The Fig Tree 81-82', the school magazine, was published in spite of technical difficulties. The main theme was on the growth and development of the school as reflected in school life. It presented a concise but realistic picture of the main events of the year and recorded a wide variety of activities organized by the clubs and societies in the school.

Two issues of 'The Bridge', the school newspaper, were published during the year under review. The newspaper fulfilled its role by giving a profile of the highlights of the school functions and featuring interesting articles from students.

To promote the students' interests in extensive reading and independent research, the library is well stocked with varied reading materials. Every effort has been made to improve the library, making it an ideal place for cultural pursuits and self-education. Old books were disposed of and new books recommended by the teaching staff were added. The total number of books in English was 24110 and that in Chinese 6980, making a total of 31090.

**The Religious Side**

The school does not give any formal religious instruction, but there are three societies organizing religious activities for and giving spiritual guidance to the pupils. The Christian Fellowship and the Catholic Society held regular meetings and morning prayers. Other activities included Bible studies, hymn-singing, talks, discussions, film and slide shows. The Buddhist Association also organized activities such as talks and discussions.

**Careers Guidance and Employment Opportunities**

Vocational guidance was given due attention. Working alongside the Careers Section of the Education Department, valuable information on studies abroad and local employment opportunities was posted up on the Careers Notice-board. Students were counselled to orientate themselves in society when they left school. The careers talks and visits to careers exhibitions arranged were geared to this end. Above all, the much sought for individual counselling was offered by the Careers Master.

**Guidance and Counselling Service**

For three years, our school has joined the School Social Work Scheme jointly organized by the Education Department and the Social Welfare Department. A school social worker, Miss Cheung, came to the school every Monday afternoon to assist students with problems which might hinder their development academically, socially or emotionally.

**Student Careers****Upper Six**

Among the 105 upper six students who completed the Matriculation course, 67 were admitted to the University of Hong Kong. Our students' interest in and potentialities for academic studies are revealed by the following statistics:-

Three students were admitted to the Chinese University of Hong Kong, 10 enrolled at the Hong Kong Polytechnic while 7 students went abroad for further studies. Six repeated Form Upper 6 in other schools and 6 began to work.

**Lower 6**

Thirteen students gained entry to the Chinese University of Hong Kong and three furthered their studies overseas.

**Form 5**

Out of a total of 176 students who sat for the Hong Kong Certificate of Education, 90 continued their studies in Form Lower 6 in this school and 51 in other schools. Twelve repeated Form 5 in this school and 3 in other schools. As to the rest of them, two were enrolled at post-secondary colleges, one studied commercial courses in a private institute. Eight went abroad for further studies, and four began to work.

The above figures show that the majority of our students were enthusiastic in pursuing further academic studies, either locally or abroad. Only a small percentage entered employment.

**Form 3**

192 Form 3 students participated in the 1981/1982 Junior Secondary Education Assessment Scheme and the results of the allocation of aided Form 4 places were as follows:-

190 students were allocated back to this school. As regards the remaining two students, one was allocated to another school, whereas the other went to a technical institute.

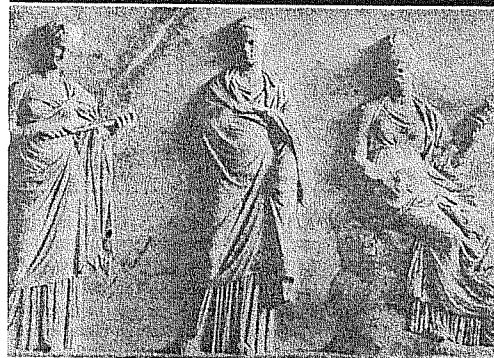

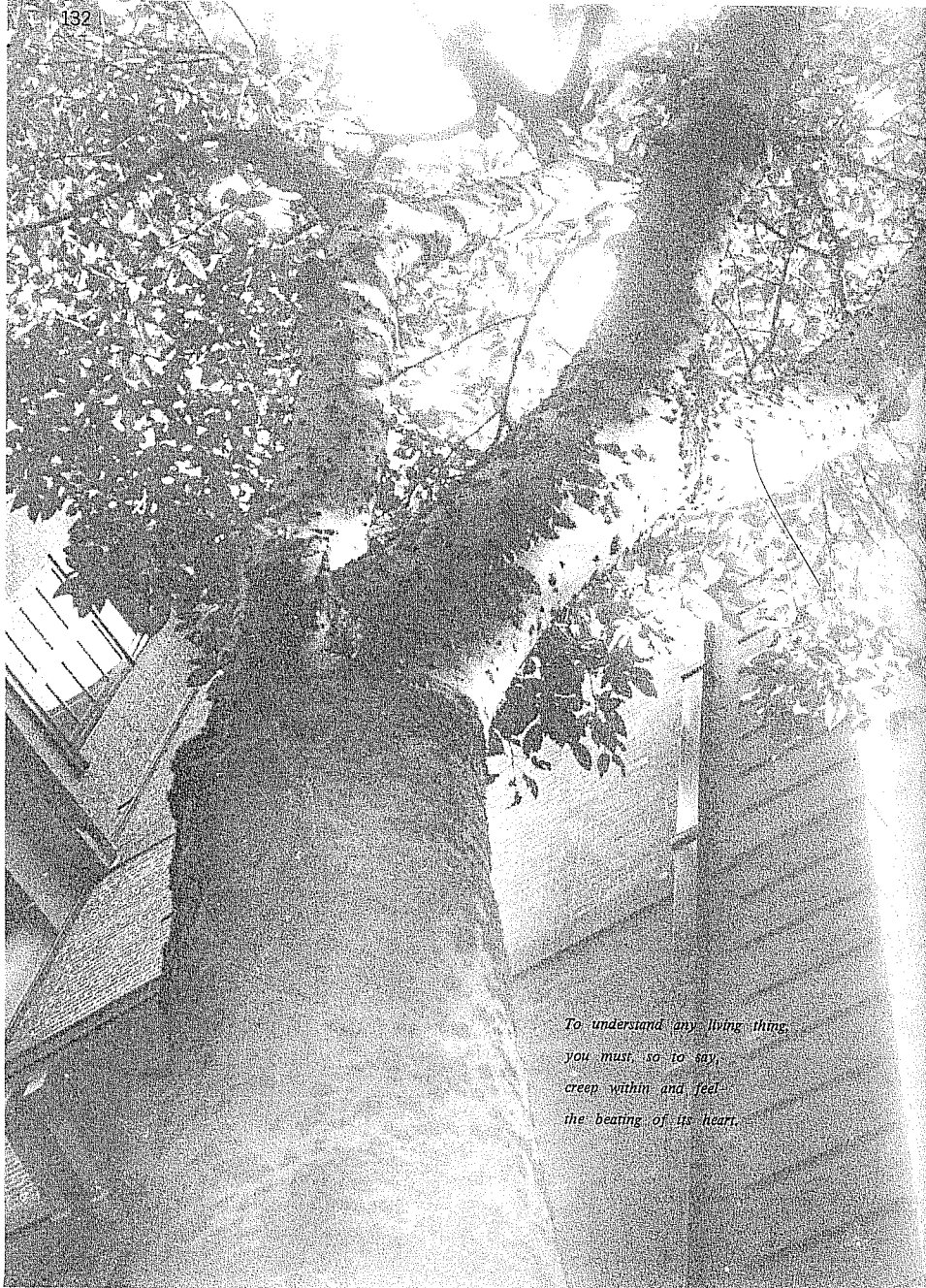

## Form 5

Out of a total of 227 students who entered for the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination, 69 continued their studies in Form Lower 6 in this school and 103 in other schools. One repeated F. 5 in this school and 18 in other schools. As to the rest of them, 7 were enrolled in commercial and vocational classes, one enrolled in Hong Kong Polytechnic, 4 enrolled in technical institutes, 6 went abroad for further studies and 5 obtained employment. In addition, 6 carried on with private studies or enrolled in evening schools.

The above figures show that the majority of our students were enthusiastic in pursuing further studies, either locally or abroad. Only a small percentage entered employment.

## Form 3

188 Form 3 students participated in the 1982/1983 Junior Secondary Education Assessment Scheme. All the students were allocated back to this school to study Form 4 in 1983/84, except one who had been absent for the whole year due to illness. A place in Form 3 is offered to him in the current academic year.

There were 34 classes. Each of Form 1, Form 2, Form 3 and Form 4 was divided into 5 streams, Form 5 into 6 streams and Form 6 (Lower and Upper) into 4 streams. Students were offered a broad general education before they specialized in arts or science in Form Lower 6. Form 5 students were given reasonable freedom to choose their subjects and most of them took at least eight subjects in the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination.

The prefects were selected from among students of Form 4, Form 5 and Form 6. They worked under the guidance and supervision of the Principal, the Discipline Master and other members of the staff. They helped in maintaining the discipline of the school. When the regular prefects were released from duties to prepare for examinations, their places were taken up by other students selected from Form 4 and Form Lower 6.

**The Literary Side**

"The Fig Tree 82-83", the school magazine, was published in spite of technical difficulties. The main theme was on the growth and development of the school as reflected in school life. It presented a concise but realistic picture of the main events of the year and recorded a wide variety of activities organized by the clubs and societies in the school.

One issue of "The Bridge", the school newspaper, was published during the year under review. The newspaper fulfilled its role by giving a profile of the highlights of the school functions and featuring interesting articles from students.

To promote the students' interests in extensive reading and independent research, the library is well stocked with varied reading materials. Every effort has been made to improve the library, making it an ideal place for cultural pursuits and self-education. Old books were disposed of and new books recommended by the teaching staff were added. The total number of books in English was 15,600 and that in Chinese was 5,020, making a total of 20,620.

**The Religious Side**

The school does not provide any formal religious education, but there are three societies organizing religious activities for and giving spiritual guidance to the students. The Christian Fellowship and the Catholic Society held regular meetings and morning prayers. Other activities included Bible studies, hymn-singing, talks, discussions, film and slide shows. The Buddhist Association also organized activities such as talks and discussions regularly.

**Careers Guidance and Employment Opportunities**

Vocational guidance was given due attention. Working alongside the Careers Education Section of the Education Department, valuable information on overseas studies and local employment opportunities was posted up on the Careers Notice-board. Students were counselled to orientate themselves in society when they left school. The careers talks, the careers convention, and the various other careers activities arranged were geared to this end. Above all, the much sought for individual counselling was offered by the Careers Master.

**Guidance and Counselling Service**

For four years, the school has joined the school Social Work Scheme jointly organized by the Education Department and the Social Welfare Department. A school social worker came to the school every Monday to assist students with problems which might hinder their development academically, socially or emotionally.

Art is another popular activity in the school. One of our pupils came first in the "Anti-smoking Poster Design Competition" sponsored by the Community Youth Club. Our pupils also participated in the "Rehabilitation Services Poster Design Competition" and the "Anti-narcotics Painting Competition", both sponsored by the District Office, and were awarded the Second and the Third prizes respectively.

Achievements in sports were equally encouraging. We have very strong B-grade and C-grade Handball Teams. This is shown by the following results:

First in the B-grade Inter-school Handball Competition;

First in the Invitation Tournament organized by the Hong Kong Sports Association;

First in the Children Cup Open Competition organized by Hong Kong Amateur Handball Association.

Our B-grade Team was the 1st runner-up whereas the C-grade Team was the champion in the Inter-school Volleyball Championship, Division One, Hong Kong Area. Consequently, we came first in the overall results.

For the past few years, we have been gradually broadening the curriculum to meet changing needs. Every effort has been made to provide pupils with a choice of subjects at Form 4 level so that each pupil can develop his special interests and talents as fully as possible.

King's College is the only government grammar school to offer Principles of Accounts in its curriculum. We introduced the subject in Form 3 in 1981-82, and our fifth form will be sitting for the subject in the forthcoming H.K.C.E. Examination. In the year reported on, 140 pupils sat for the L.C.C. & I Examination, for the first time in the history of King's, and obtained a total of 96 distinctions - a most commendable result. In view of the extreme popularity of the subject among pupils, we are planning to extend it to Form Lower Six in 1984-85. We also offer Art and Design to our pupils up to Form 5 level. Such training enables them to take up Fine Art or Design at post-secondary colleges if they so wish.

The aim of education will not be fulfilled if the training of good citizenship is lacking. I am pleased to say that pupils of King's College are public-spirited and are enthusiastic in voluntary services. Members of the Social Service Group have been paying regular visits to the John F. Kennedy Centre since 1981 under the Sister School Scheme. They maintain friendly relations with the handicapped children there, playing with them on their Sports Day and having joint functions with them such as quizzes and debates. Apart from this, about seventy pupils participated in the "Walk for Millions" this year. It is also an annual function for our Junior Red Cross Unit to arrange a Blood Donation Day with the Hong Kong Red Cross. This year, 134 pupils donated blood.

I wish now to express my sincere gratitude to all the teaching staff, particularly Mr. S.Y. Poon and Mr. Y.W. Sun, the Senior Masters, for their loyal co-operation, hard work and constant assistance during the year, I also wish to thank the laboratory staff, the minor staff, and the school clerks for their contribution to the life and management of the school. It is also appropriate to give a note of thanks to the Head-Prefect, the Vice-Headprefects and the Prefect Body, whose role in maintaining discipline and order is so important to the school. Finally I wish to thank the student Librarians and the Scouts for their devoted services to the school.

On behalf of the school, I would like to extend to you all my sincere gratitude for your presence here this afternoon. It is especially my pleasure and honour to welcome you, Mr. Chow, for your home-coming after a considerable lapse of time. I am also grateful to Mrs. Chow for kindly consenting to distribute the scholarships and prizes.

Mr. Edmund Chow was a student of King's College in the pre-war years. Besides being a lawyer by profession, he is also an Urban Councillor. Mr. Chow is at present the Chairman of the Urban Council's District Relation Committee, the Chairman of the City Hall Booking Sub-committee and the Vice-Chairman of the Food Hygiene Select Committee. We are all proud of such a prominent old boy who sets an example to those who are still in school. We deeply appreciate his being here with us this afternoon in view of his heavy commitments professionally and in community services.

I am also glad to welcome Dr. Kwan Lai-hung, President of the King's Old Boys' Association. I am sure that pupils of King's College all know Dr. Kwan well, for they are still receiving the Kwan Ka Chuen Memorial Scholarship. 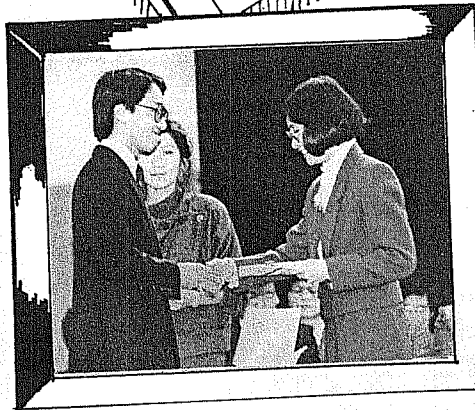
As customary, a copy of the detailed Annual Report has been distributed, and I shall only attempt to highlight selected aspects of the report.

We continued to maintain a relatively high standard in public examinations. In the Advanced Level Examination, we entered 104 candidates and achieved 56 distinctions and 211 credits. It is interesting to note that eight out of eleven A.L. subjects had a 100% pass rate. In the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination, we entered 227 candidates and scored 213 distinctions and 673 credits.

We concern ourselves not only with the academic progress of our pupils, but also with their development in character and personality. For this reason, we have attempted to provide a wide variety of opportunities for extra-curricular activities and have encouraged pupils to strike a balance between academic studies and out-of-school activities.

In the 35th Hong Kong School Music Festival, our Chinese Instrumental Orchestra, being the champion in the Senior Class, won the Dr. Bliss Wiant Trophy. The Chinese Ensemble also won the First Prize and the Radio Television Hong Kong Prize. Furthermore, the Chinese Quartet teams succeeded to win all the first, second and third prizes and carried off the Yuet Wah Trophy again. In the Solo Section, three of our pupils were champions and also winners of the Radio Television Hong Kong Prizes. Both our Harmonica Band and Harmonica Ensemble were first runners-up in their competitions. In the harmonica solo classes, our pupils gained one first prize, one second prize and one third prize.

### Principal's Speech

Mr. & Mrs. Ho, Dr. Kwan, Ladies and Gentlemen:

It gives me great pleasure to welcome you all to our Speech Day this afternoon. I wish, in particular, to thank Mr. Frederick Ho for doing us the honour of addressing the school and Mrs. Ho for presenting the scholarships and prizes.

Mr. Ho is by no means a stranger of King's College. He was a Chemistry teacher and the Careers Master of King's College in 1966 - 1969. In 1969, he was transferred to the Examination Section of the Education Department and later to the Statistics Department. During the years 1975 to 1978. Mr. Ho acquired many professional qualifications by attending courses on different branches of statistics in overseas institutes, namely, Institute of Social Studies in Holland, the University of Michigan in the United States and the International Monetary Fund. In 1981, he again furthered his knowledge by taking up a course on management in Henley Management College in England. His unceasing efforts brought him success in his profession. Mr. Ho is now the Assistant Commissioner of the Census & Statistics Department. We are indeed proud of having him with us this afternoon.

I am also glad to welcome Dr. Kwan Lai-hung, President of the King's College Old Boys' Association. Dr. Kwan has left no stone unturned in his endeavour of fostering closer relationship between the Association and the school. His presence here today is a vivid proof of this.

In your hands is a concise report of the achievements of the past academic year which proved once again to be a fruitful year. The academic standard continued to be fairly high. In the Hong Kong Advanced Level Examination, we entered 113 candidates and scored 96 distinctions, and 216 credits, an increase of 40 distinctions over the previous year. They also obtained 6 distinctions and 51 credits and a 100% pass rate in Use of English. Some individual results are also worth-mentioning. HUNG Chi Ming obtained Grade A in Use of English and Grade A1 in 4 science subjects. LIAO Hiu-chung obtained Grade B in Use of English and Grade A in 4 science subjects. CHAN Kwok-wing and CHEUNG King-man also obtained Grade A in 4 science subjects. 192 Form 5 students sat for the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination and scored 167 distinctions and 558 credits.

While reviewing the academic achievements, I am proud to mention two of our Form Six students for their commendable performance. LIAO Hiu-chung of F. U6B (1984) was selected as one of the four students in Hong Kong for the LEE Shau-kee Studentship tenable at Wadham College, Oxford University, England. The criteria for selection include good results in the Hong Kong Advanced Level Examination, distinguished performance in Music and Sports and recommendation of the Principal. Another student, CHAN Kai-yuen of F. U6B (1985) was offered an Open Scholarship by the Oxford University. This is an honorary scholarship awarded for meritorious performance in the admission examination. CHAN Kai-yuen ranked first among the thirty candidates admitted into the course he applied for. I would like to take this opportunity to wish them a bright and prosperous future.

King's College is one of the pilot schools in introducing Computer Studies. This year, the subject is taught in Form 5. Principles of Accounts was introduced to students of Form 3 in 1981, and students of Form Lower Six are now offered this subject. We feel that by broadening our curriculum and thus offering more choices of subjects to the students, we are in a better position to take care of students of different talents and interests.

Much discussion has been generated on the subject of civic and moral education in recent years. We believe that extra-curricular activities have a unique role to play in this connection. Thus, extra-curricular activities are also an integral part of our school life. Through extra-curricular activities, in my opinion, students may learn the relations between individual rights and obligations. They learn how to share and cooperate with their schoolmates besides gaining enjoyment themselves. Furthermore, it is through out-of-class activities that their personality and leadership can be cultivated.

In the 36th Hong Kong Schools Music Festival, our Harmonica Ensemble won the Championship and the Sherley Shield Trophy whereas the Harmonica Band came second. In the Harmonica Concert Work section, Mok Chi Chiu of F. U6D came first and was awarded the YMCA Harmonica Orchestra Trophy and a voucher of \$150. In the solo section, our students gained one first prize, one second prize and two third prizes. The result of the Chinese Instrumental Group was also encouraging. Both our Chinese Ensemble and Chinese quartet were champions. Both our Chinese Orchestra and our Asian Instrumental Group were first runners-up. In the solo section, our students won 3 first prizes, 2 second prizes and 2 third prizes.

Art continued to gain popularity in the school. Our students won the third prize in the Inter-school Debating Contest 83 - 84 Poster Design Competition sponsored by the Bank of America and the Inter-school Debating Society. Six of our students were awarded Certificate of Participation in the Hong Kong Children's Art Exhibition sponsored by the Urban Council and the Museum of Art. They also won the second prize in the Rehabilitation Service Poster Design Competition sponsored by the Central and Western District Office.

In sports, our students participated in many inter-school competitions. The most outstanding result was gained by our handball teams. Our A-Grade Handball Team was champion twice in inter-school competitions: Our C-Grade team was also champion in the Second Children's Cup Handball Open Competition. The result in volleyball competitions was also pleasing. Our C-Grade Volleyball Team was the champion in the Hong Kong Area Division One Competition. In the boys overall results, the K.C. Team came second. Our school was also the first runner-up in the Hong Kong Area Cross Country Championships. Our C-Grade Cross Country Team was second in the Hong Kong Area Cross Country Competition. As to individual results in athletics, cross country and swimming, our students scored 6 champions, 5 second prizes and 10 third prizes.

Our Science Society took part in the 17th Joint Schools Science Exhibition held in the City Hall in the summer of 1984. Our students put up a project entitled "Material Science". They won three top-grade awards, namely "Best Individual Project", "Best Demonstration" and "Overall Champion".

We have not forgotten the importance of social service. King's College and John F. Kennedy Centre are sister schools. During the year under review, students of our Social Service Group paid regular visits to John F. Kennedy Centre and had joint functions with the physically handicapped children there, such as picnic, barbecue, debate, quiz and basketball match. They also worked together in preparing a "Chinese Literature Week". On our School Open Day, our students invited some of their children to come and arranged for them a guided tour. As in past years, the Social Service Group took part in the "Walk for Millions" on Hong Kong Island, raising an amount of a few thousand dollars. Besides the above activities, the Social Service Group also participated with the Hong Kong Catholic Marriage Advisory Council in the organization of a Fun Fair in Charter Park, Central District, and actively took part in the Joint Schools Fun Fair in St. Paul's Convent School for the mentally handicapped children.

Members of the Junior Red Cross Cadet and the Junior Police Call Club were also public-spirited. In the past year, the Junior Red Cross Cadet kept a promising record of social service. They organized a picnic for the orphans of the S.K.H. St. Christopher's Home, an outing in July with the pupils of Canossa School for the Visually Disabled, and a two-day project of taking care of the old men in Rennie's Mill Social Centre for the Elderly. They also took part in the services arranged by the Red Cross Headquarters for the aged in the Western District, taking their weight, measuring their blood pressure and making tests on urine etc. Likewise, members of the Junior Police Call Club took part in the selling of raffle tickets for a number of charity organizations, such as St. James Settlement Wan Chai Community Centre, Boys and Girls Association and Hong Kong Association of the Blind.

These activities illustrate that the students of King's College show concern for the community they live in and are actively involved in its affairs. They will surely grow up to be good citizens. This is so important for the future of Hong Kong.

In the year reported on, the Senior Masters, Mr. S.Y. Poon and Mr. Y.W. Sun, worked devotedly for the administration and the smooth running of the school. I wish to express my sincere gratitude to them. Besides them, all other teaching staff worked diligently and cooperatively. The school clerical staff, the laboratory staff and the minor staff also contributed much to the management of the school. To them all, I wish to convey my heart-felt thanks. It is also appropriate to give a note of thanks to the Head-Prefect, the Vice Head-Prefects and the Prefect Body, the School Librarian, the student librarians and the Scouts, whose services to the school are also essential.

Now I have much pleasure in requesting Mrs. Ho to distribute the scholarships and prizes.

There were 33 classes. Each of Form 1, Form 2, Form 3, Form 4 and Form 5 was divided into 5 streams and Form 6 (Lower and Upper) into 4 streams. With the introduction of Computers Studies and Principles of Accounts into the curriculum, the students were required to choose either the arts stream or the science stream in Form 4. However, they were given reasonable freedom to choose their subjects and most of them took at least eight in the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination.

Class division in Form Upper 6 remained the same as in the previous year. But in Form Lower 6, there were one Arts class, one Biology class, one Mathematics class, and one class which consisted of students taking either mathematics or biology.

Cultural education and physical training are of prime importance to a well-balanced education. Thus, from Form 1 to Form 6, there were two physical education periods in a cycle. Music was taught up to Form 3 and art up to Form 5. Though the two cultural subjects were not included in the curricula of Form 5 and Form 6, senior students were encouraged to take an active role in the activities organized by the Music Association and the Art Club so that they could explore their musical talents or refine their artistic skills. Their distinguished achievements in the various art competitions and in the Hong Kong Schools Music Festival were highly commendable.

The prefects were selected from among students of Form 4, Form 5 and Form 6. They worked under the guidance and supervision of the Principal, the Discipline Masters and other Senior members of the staff. They helped in maintaining the discipline of the school. When the regular prefects were released from duties to prepare for examinations, their places were taken up by other students selected from Form 4 and Form Lower 6.

## The Literary side

"The Fig Tree, 83-84", the school magazine, was published in spite of technical difficulties. The main theme was the growth and development of the school as reflected in school life. It presented a concise and realistic picture of the main events of the school year and recorded a wide variety of activities organized by different clubs and societies of the school.

Two issues of "The Bridge", the school newspaper, were published during the year under review. The newspaper fulfilled its role by giving a profile of the highlights of the school functions and featuring interesting articles from students.

To promote the students' interests in extensive reading and independent research, the school library is well stocked with varied reading materials. Every effort has been made to improve the library, making it an ideal place for cultural pursuits and self-education. Old books were disposed of while new books recommended by the teaching staff were added. The total number of books in English in the year was 13,280 and that in Chinese was 4,500, making a total of 17,780.

## The religious side

The school does not provide any formal religious education, but there are three societies organizing religious activities for and giving spiritual guidance to the students. The Christian Fellowship and the Catholic Society held regular meetings and morning prayers. Other activities included Bible studies, hymn-singing, talks, discussions, film and slide shows. The Buddhist Association also organized activities such as talks and discussions regularly.

## Careers guidance and employment opportunities

Vocational guidance was given due attention. Working alongside the Careers Education Section of the Education Department and the Youth Employment Advisory Service of the Labour Department, valuable information on overseas studies and local employment opportunities was posted up on the careers notice-board. Students were counselled to orientate themselves in society when they left school. The careers talks, the careers convention and the various other careers activities organized were geared to this end. Above all, the much sought for individual counselling was offered by the Careers Master.

## Guidance and Counselling service

For five years, the school has joined the school social work scheme jointly organized by the Education Department and the Social Welfare Department. A school social worker came to the school every Monday to assist students with problems which might hinder their development academically, socially or emotionally.

### Form 5

Of the 194 students who entered for the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination, 141 entered for Lower 6, 4 enrolled in commercial/vocational classes, 4 enrolled in Hong Kong Polytechnic Technical Institutes, 8 left Hong Kong for further studies, 3 obtained employment, 5 were engaged in part-time education and 2 were seeking employment.

The above figures show that the majority of students were enthusiastic in pursuing further studies, locally or abroad. Only a small percentage entered employment.

### Form 3

Of the 192 students participating in the 1983/84 Junior Secondary Education Assessment Scheme, 190 were promoted to F.4 in this school and 2 in other schools.
